Seeks Sixth Win



BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that a Public Hearing will be held by the Planning Commission of the Township of Bloomfield, Oakland County, Michigan, on the 17th day of 1944, at 8 o'clock a.m., at the Township Hall, 4209 Telegraph Road, in said Township for the purpose of considering the following proposed ordinance:
TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 97, MAINTAINING ADDITIONAL TO FOOTPRINTS
 (a) Every lot on which a multiple dwelling structure is erected shall be provided with a 20 foot wide sidewalk on each side of such lot. Each side yard shall be increased by one (1) foot for each ten (10) feet or part thereof by which the length of the multiple dwelling structure exceeds forty (40) feet in overall dimension along the adjoining lot line. In order to preserve the general open character of the residential district, the height of such structure shall be limited in length to one hundred (100) feet. Rear yards and spaces between buildings shall be provided on the following basis:
 1 and 2 foot structures — 25 feet rear yards.
 A six (6) foot obscuring masonry wall shall be provided along the exterior lot line of the multiple family residential district wherever the parking area and/or service drive adjacent to abutting one family residential districts. The Board of Appeals, on good cause shown, may exempt any such structure from the above requirements. The height requirement of a six (6) foot wall, in modifying the height requirement of the Board of Appeals may set further requirements or conditions for the parcel. In no residential district abutting such multiple-family parcel. It is further ordered that a public hearing on this ordinance shall be held on the 17th day of 1944 at 8 o'clock a.m. at the Township Hall, 4209 Telegraph Road, in said Township.
