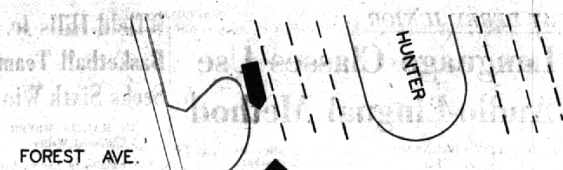

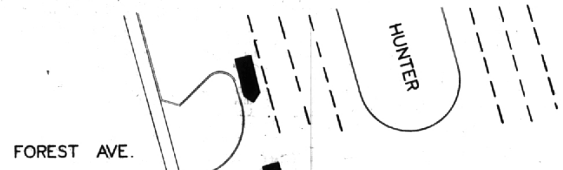

**Confusion at Car Wash**

Southbound Hunter vehicles (Car 1 and 2) going into the car wash are blocking southbound Hunter lane No. 4 and all Forest traffic. The right way to approach the car wash is shown in the bottom diagram. Southbound Hunter traffic should proceed west on Forest (Car 2) and turn into driveway only when moving east on Forest (Car 1). **Offer Tax Refunds  
Again in Bond Form**

Federal income taxpayers are reminded by Alfred C. Girard, savings bond chairman for Oakland County, that the treasury is again offering them the option of taking refunds in U. S. Savings Bonds.

"BY ELECTING to take his refund in Series E bonds," Girard said, "the taxpayer holds onto his money conveniently, through a secure, risk-free investment which pays interest at a guaranteed rate. He avoids seeing his money absorbed by household expenses, vanishing completely in day-to-day spending."

Taxpayers taking their 1962 refunds in savings bonds swelled the 1963 bond sales by \$19.2 million and raised the number of bonds issued by 237,465.

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**Council Rejects Talk  
On Multiple Dwellings**

**BEVERLY HILLS**—A developer's attempt to start proceedings to have a category for multiple dwellings added to the zoning ordinance was postponed by the council last week.

President Pro Tem Hugh G. Allerton, Jr., explained to David Robinson that the council was not in a position to entertain a presentation at this time.

"TONIGHT," Allerton explained, "the council is not in a position to either deny the petition, set a public hearing or comply with your specific request for multiple." "If we are going to go to a public hearing," he added, "we would have to satisfy ourselves that multiple dwelling is advisable."

Two properties on which Metropolitan Engineers requested approval of subdividing were sent to the planning board for study and recommendation.

ONE IS OWNED by Mrs. Ralph Shroder at Beverly and Evergreen roads. The other, at Riverside and Evergreen, the owner, Walter C. Bem, would like to divide into four lots, approximately 100 feet wide and 450 feet deep. The planning board was requested by the council to look into lot size, grades, dedication of the road and sidewalks.

A request by Detroit Country Day School at 18 Mile Road and Lahser for a water tap was authorized if the conditions laid down by the village engineers, Johnson and Anderson, are met, that the village attorney approve the easement for tapping into the Georgetown Green main, and that the proposed fire hydrant be used for fire fighting only. The school will pay all costs.

Edward J. Woods, 16173 Marguerite, told the council that he was afraid the grade of the new house being built next to his was too high. The council assured him that the village building inspector would look into it immediately.

A REQUEST by Guilmet to make a new classification on the tax bill of the South Berkshire Water Tax to replace a general heading, was approved. The replacement permits the village to use the same equipment for preparing the tax statement.

Village Manager Robert E. Murphy was authorized to attend the City Managers Association meeting in Ann Arbor Feb. 5-7. Village Attorney Thomas J. Dillon advised the council not to answer the petition for modification of a consent agreement reached in 1960 between Schmitt, et al, and the Beverly Hills Athletic Association.

The modification would be on membership, guest rules and other operating procedures in the club.

THE ADMINISTRATION Commission was directed to take under advisement a direction from the legislature, passed in the second special session of 1963, that two Democrats and two Republicans serve on a local board of canvassers for the election. The council must appoint the board before the spring election, March 9.

**Medical Expenses  
Is Survey Topic  
Of Hills' Families**

A number of families in Bloomfield Hills will soon be interviewed to find out their use of medical and hospital care in 1963 and the expenses involved by the end of January.

The interviews are conducted as part of a series of nationwide studies sponsored by the Health Information Foundation of the University of Chicago. The interview will also show how families meet medical expenses and to what extent they benefit from health insurance protection.

"THE FAMILIES interviewed will be helping important research and will contribute to a better understanding of the health needs of our people," said George Bugbee, president of the foundation. "We conducted similar surveys in 1958 and 1959 and are hoping now to find out what changes have taken place in the last five years. In addition, we are interested in comparing the results of the 1963 study with the findings of health studies in Sweden and Great Britain."
