

Potpourri By JULIE CANDLER

After hearing him speak to Theta Sigma Phi members at the Detroit Press Club last week, we could write six columns about Detroiter Charles Feinberg.

And we guarantee you wouldn't be bored by a line of it. This collector and lover of good literature owns more than 3,000 volumes on Walt Whitman and is a world-recognized authority on the poet.

When he was 17, Charles Feinberg started gathering unto himself written clues to the mysterious genius of great writers. He bought a letter written by Walt Whitman for \$7.50. At the time, the London-born youth was making a weekly salary of \$22.50.

You get some of the feeling of that letter's worth to its IT-year-old owner when you hear Feinberg say:

"... THIS WAS the paper that he had touched ... the words that he had written ... that he had looked on."

The handwritten and typed words of some of our nation's finest writers now belong to the fantastic Feinberg collection. It includes some of the handwritten treasures left behind by Feinberg's late friend Robert Frost. He is a friend to many of the important writers of today—John Ciardi, Marianne Moore and Karl Shapiro among them.

It began, "My mother made a failure of her life. I am making a success of my life..." (Its value, Feinberg told a curious TSP member, is about \$1,000. But he will Never sell.)

THERE WAS THE next-to-the-last draft in Thornton Wilder's neat handwriting of "Heaven Is My Destination." There was Whitman's scrawled trial manuscript of "Oh Captain!" My Captain! My Captain! A whole notebook of unused notes left over from Karl Shapiro's new book was generously doodled with faces. We especially liked Hemingway, the long, straight letters written with the flair of an artist by ole Papa himself. He wrote the notes in Nairobi, Africa, in 1938, and they were never published.

Feinberg gave Potpourri permission to publish the first paragraph, though he says there's a chance we may both go to jail for it.

"TO WRITE THIS sort of thing," said the immortal Mr. Hemingway, "you need a typewriter. To describe, to narrate, to write funny cracks, you need a typewriter; to fake along, to stall, to make light reading, to make a good piece, you need luck, two or more drinks and a typewriter. Gentlemen, there is no typewriter." That's a perfect place to end, but I must tell you that Feinberg was introduced by TSP President Barbara Marx of the Birmingham Board of Education's public relations department.
