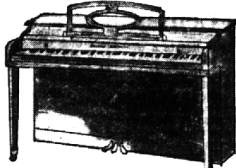

result of a marital triangle, police said. According to friends, Foster had been dating Mrs. Herrington since early last spring when she started divorce proceedings against her husband for "extreme cruelty." Herrington, a wholesale sales executive for Stroh Brewery, Detroit, and his wife, Betty, said they were seeking a reconciliation in the apartment when Foster arrived. They told police that Foster repeatedly shouted he was going to kill Herrington. Police later found no weapon on the dentist.

HERRINGTON SAID he warned Foster not to come through the door and when he did Herrington fired twice from a .38-caliber revolver, hitting the dentist in the left leg and the left side of the chest. Foster was dead on arrival at William Beaumont Hospital. The dentist had been married twice. He was divorced from his first wife and his second wife committed suicide in November, 1962.

Police Arrest Three Women for Shoplifting Carey to Address Michigan Chamber

Bloomfield Township police made two shoplifting arrests within a week at the Miracle Mile Shopping Center, the first involving a Pontiac woman, the second including two Detroit women.

Alice Pitta, 25, of 102 Elm Street, Pontiac, was apprehended Sept. 23 for stealing groceries from the Kroger store in the shopping center. She pleaded guilty to Justice Alice Gilbert Tuesday morning and was fined \$25 plus \$20 costs and three days in the county jail.

Kenneth Robbins, 29, of 812 Chapin, is claimed by witnesses to have held up the Big D Market at Greenfield near 12 Mile Road, Southfield, at 9 p.m. Saturday. He was accompanied by James E. Shelton, 15, of Detroit, who is now in the Oakland County Detention Home.

Two Berkeley police cars, summoned by a stockboy, chased the suspects as they emerged from the supermarket. Robbins was shot as they sped through the exit of the supermarket's lot. Joining in the chase were police cars from Southfield, Royal Oak and Beverly Hills.

THE PAIR sped west on Edwards to Southfield Road, turned north where it later crashed at Beverly Road into a car driven by Dr. Burns G. Newby, 42. Newby, of 32101 Weston Drive, Beverly Hills, is in satisfactory condition at Beaumont with acute cervical injuries. Arriving directly after the crash was a Beverly Hills patrol car driven by Patrolmen John Knotts and Gerald Hunter. They took the accident report and called an ambulance.

Walter F. Carey, 6125 Middlebelt, West Bloomfield Township, will address the annual meeting of the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce in Detroit next Thursday. Carey is president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.
