"It is not too much to remind the white and Negro extremists among us that theirs is a losing battle. For they must accept the fact that the overwhelming majority of Americans of every region, or economic level, or race, or creed, believe in law, order and justice."

I WISH ALL Americans could get this message. With all of the emphasis on civil rights today, too many people are fooled into believing that the riots are actually caused by racial uneasiness.

Swallowed up in emotionalism, they fail to comprehend the significance of the smashing of store windows and the stealing of liquor.

Would that there were more Bill Burghums in the cities across the land to point this out to the unsuspecting citizens.

Would, too, that the citizens who believe in law and order would prevail over those who engage in vandalism and hoodlumism.

A top official of the World Council of Churches, the Rt. Rev. J. E. Lesslie Newbigin, will be principal speaker during the Friday Detroit Assembly of the International Convention of Christian Churches, which begins in Cobo Hall Friday night.

Bishop Newbigin, a general secretary of the World Council and director of its division of World Mission, will preach during the assembly's ecumenical worship service in Cobo arena Sunday afternoon.

HE ALSO will give four Biblical lectures during morning sessions of the assembly.

A leader of the Church of South India, Bishop Newbigin was instrumental in the formation of that church in 1947 through the union of Presbyterian, Congregational, Methodist and Anglican churches.

He first went to India as a village missionary in 1936.

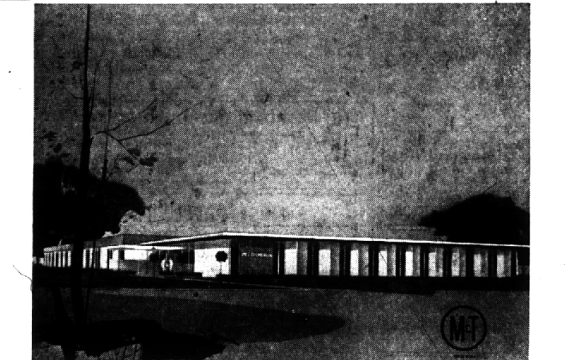
