

Michigan's Hunting Season Under Way for 150,000

Fields, forests and water-rimmed areas will come alive today with the cracking sounds of guns and the twang of bows as firearm hunters open up on small game, geese and bear in northern Michigan while archers start stalking deer and bear throughout the state.

For the 150,000-plus sportsmen who will be on hand when the action begins, the season's shooting prospects are generally as good as they were in 1963.

Among those who should find things to their liking are upper peninsula ruffed grouse hunters. With "mat" numbers up in their region, they are expected to top last year's take of 195,000 birds.

Elsewhere on the state's northern hunting front, the goose season should get off to a good start, with local birds providing most of the action. Conservation men look for flights of geese later in the fall which will at least measure up to those of a year ago. Ready and waiting for more thrills after their first early season in September are upper peninsula hunters who get back into the swing of things Oct. 1. Prospects are good.

ANOTHER EXTREMELY modest deer kill is expected in the northern lower peninsula. The early season has been shortened to the Oct. 3-5 period because of the animals' dwindling numbers.

Archery deer hunters, who are expected to be about 40,000 strong, have every reason to go afire with high hopes this season. The state's deer herd is again at a near-record size, paralleling its population of 1963 when bow and arrow enthusiasts took 2,140 whitetails.

Another important target date coming up for Michigan sportsmen is Oct. 8, this fall's opener for duck hunting throughout the state and goose shooting in the southern lower peninsula.

Compared with last season, duck hunters should score a higher take on the first day as a result of having their starting time moved ahead to sunrise. They can look for a good supply of home-grown ducks on most of the state's interior potholes, marshes and beaver ponds when the season gets under way.

Duck flights which will push through Michigan this fall are predicted to be about the same as last year when hunters jumped their kill to nearly 250,000 birds.

LOW WATER LEVELS will pose a problem for waterfowl hunting.
