### Tourist Council To Make Color Film of Autumn

Michigan's autumn wonders will be pictured in full color in a half-hour film produced this fall by the Michigan Tourist Council, it was announced today by William T. McGraw, council director.

The film is scheduled to be ready for distribution next summer, McGraw said, replacing an autumn film produced 10 years ago and shown to millions of Michigan vacation prospects in the mid-west and Canada.

The council has three other half-hour films: "Michigan — Winter Wonderland," "Fishing in Michigan," and "Michigan — Water Wonderland." Copies are available for television stations, and civic, professional, fraternal, church and school groups.

PRODUCTION OF the autumn film was approved recently by council members during a two-day meeting at Birch Lodge, Higgins Lake.

The Council also endorsed a Michigan State University proposal to expand its extension-education program for the tourist industry. The proposal was outlined by Dr. Henry O. Barbour, head of MSU's School of Hotel, Restaurant and Institutional Management.

In other business, the Council learned that a state sponsored \$78,000 study of tourism and its impact on Michigan's economy is on schedule and is expected to be completed by mid-1965.

The study is being conducted by Central Michigan University's Division of Economic Expansion and Technical Assistance and financed through a grant of the Michigan legislature.

### Parents' Day Is Scheduled At University

Parents of Oakland University will gather on the OU campus for the second annual Parents' Day, Oct. 17, sponsored by the Friends of Oakland, according to Dean Coffin, chairman of the parents committee.

Invitations to spend the day on campus are being mailed this week, Coffin announced.

Parents will have the chance to learn more about the University, its faculty and curriculum at a day-long program, opening with a convocation in the new Baldwin Memorial Pavilion.

Guests will attend their choice of lectures on subjects related to contemporary problems.

INCLUDED IN the lecture topics are "Why Men Hate," "Public

Opinion and American Foreign Policy," and "The Voice of Protest in the Contemporary Novel." The lectures will be followed by a luncheon in the Oakland Center at which faculty members will act as hosts.

An afternoon panel, including the dean of student affairs and other university officials, will discuss various aspects of student life.

The day's events will close with a reception in the Oakland Center for parents and faculty.

During the day all university facilities including the newly completed Hill House dormitory, the Kresge Library, the University Art Gallery and other campus buildings will be open for parents' inspection.

AMONG THOSE serving with Coffin on the Parents' Day committee is John Conde of Birmingham.

If persons other than parents of OU students are interested in attending the event, they should contact a member of the committee, or Mrs. June Matthews at Oakland University.

### City, MESC Set Up Youth Training Plan

The City of Birmingham and the Michigan Employment Security Commission are going to cooperate in a program to train youths in jobs of a public service nature.

City commissioners approved a program that calls for the City to hire four youths between the ages of 18 and 21 to work in the forestry and parks department.

The City and the state will share equally in the cost of the program.

Robert S. Kenning, assistant city manager and director of personnel, outlined the program to the commission.

He said the MESC, which has the over-all responsibility for the administration of the program, will certify as to occupations where training is needed, select the trainees and be responsible for the placement of the youths after the completion of the training program.

THE LOCAL government units, he said, are asked to participate in the development of projects, provide the work training station and to share equally the cost of the \$20 weekly allowance paid to the boys.

"Under Birmingham's program," Kenning said, "two youths will be trained in tree trimming and two in golf course maintenance."
