



## Lathrup Has Contest for Official Seal

LATHRUP—Plans for a contest to develop an official city seal for Lathrup were unveiled at the city council meeting Monday night.

City Administrator Gerald D. Stone said that he and the City Development Advisory Committee had already reviewed existing seals from around the country and decided that a contest would be the best means of obtaining an original design.

"First prize will be a \$100 U.S. savings bond, while second prize will be a \$50 savings bond," said Stone.

THE CONTEST WILL be open to anyone, and announcements are being sent to schools and colleges in the area. Entrants may submit more than one design.

The design should be submitted in color on white paper or card-board, 8 1/2 by 11 inches and should measure six inches in diameter. The words, "City of Lathrup Village, Michigan" should appear on the design, which may follow the theme of the city being a residential community with tree-lined avenues.

The city council and the advisory committee will judge entries.

With the words "I accept your charge in full understanding of the responsibility which you have placed upon me," Robert M. Sandoe was installed Saturday as the fifth headmaster of Cranbrook School.

Friends and faculty, representatives of other educational institutions and the Cranbrook institutions, members of the school's board of directors and board of trustees and Sandoe's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nichol Sandoe of New York City, witnessed the ceremonies—the first such ever held in the school's quadrangle.

Events of the day began at 1:30 p.m. with a procession from the administration building into the quad as Robert E. Bates, Christ Church Cranbrook school master, intoned the St. Antony Choral on the organ.

FOLLOWING THE invocation by the Rev. Robert L. Darwall, school chaplain, greetings were offered by Robert F. Grindley, chairman of the board of trustees; Martin S. Hayden, chairman of the board of directors; and Marion E. Goodale, headmistress of Kingswood School. Gov. and Mrs. George Romney attended the reception later in the afternoon in Cranbrook House and Mrs. Romney was the emcee.

Just before Sandoe was installed William T. Gossett, chairman of the drive, announced that the school's \$3 million Decade of Development program had reached \$2 million with the school collecting \$1 million and The Cranbrook Foundation matching that amount.

"I DON'T believe there is any more significant area in which I can serve than education," said Sandoe in his acceptance speech. "Education is the challenge to the dreams of mankind, the magic bridge between despair and accomplishment and the means to

SOUTHFIELD — A 44-year-old woman burned to death inside a flaming trailer here Friday afternoon at the Southfield Downs Trailer Camp, 3000 Southfield Road.

Private funeral services were held Monday in Berkeley, with burial there. Contents of the trailer were destroyed.

## Romney, Staebler Among Candidates At Political Forum

Candidates for governor, the U.S. Senate and the U.S. House of Representatives will present their views and answer questions at the Oakland Citizens League's second annual Citizens Political Forum.

Taking the platform from 7 to 10 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 21, in the Gold Room at Oakland University will be Republican Gov. George Romney; his Democratic opponent, Cong. Neil Staebler; Democratic Sen. Philip A. Hart, and the Michigan Republican nominee for the U.S. Senate, Mrs. Ely Peterson.

Congressional candidates addressing the forum will be Cong. William S. Broomfield, 18th District Republican, and his opponent, Democrat Frank Sierawski, along with Republican Richard D. Kuhn and Democrat Billie S. Farnum, 19th District nominees.

THE CONGRESSIONAL candidates will be introduced by two political news writers. Following brief talks by the candidates, the newsmen will conduct a question-and-answer session.

Detroit radio and television newsmen are expected to introduce and query Romney, Staebler, Mr. Peterson and Hart.

Seventeen civic and other organizations are joining the Oakland Citizens League in sponsoring the public service forum, which attracted 500 participants in 1963. It was initiated to give citizens an opportunity to discuss the issues in a two-way exchange with their public officials and the candidates.

FORUM CHAIRMAN is George J. Fulkerson, 3169 Middlebury, Birmingham. Acting as advisors to the forum are former Gov. Murray D. Van Wagener, Oakland University Chancellor Durward Varner, and former Oakland Prosecutor (See FORUM, 5-A)

When the doorbells ring in 25 million homes across the nation Friday and Saturday, it will be the postman with a message evoking the image and memory of a former first lady, Eleanor Roosevelt.

on the 80th anniversary of her birth. An envelope addressed to "Postal Patron Local" describes the work of the Eleanor Roosevelt Memorial Foundation, chartered by Congress shortly after her death.

Among the foundation's projects are cancer research grants, aid for underprivileged children, internship program for advancing human

LATHRUP—Details of the Oakland County Youth Assistance Program, which seeks to help juvenile delinquents, were explained to city council members at their meeting Monday night to determine whether Lathrup would enter into the program.

Jim Hunt, director of Juvenile Services for Oakland County, and Edgar Flood, superintendent of Oakland County Protective Services, told council members that the voluntary program sought to reach youngsters before they reached the courts in order to prevent a court record.

"We watch for the danger signals, such as truancy, shoplifting and trouble at home," said Flood.
