pianist and has studied in this country and abroad, was invited by Eleanor Roosevelt to play at the White House.

Mrs. Roosevelt remembers that for her first overnight visit she was given the southeast bedroom, shown as the room in which was signed the Emancipation Proclamation. Since that time her visits have been so numerous she has been a guest in all of the famous bedrooms.

**AMONG THOSE** from Birmingham who traveled to Washington for the concert were Mrs. Herbert Hills, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Winston and a reporter from the Birmingham Eccentric.

The family dinner table, Mrs. Roosevelt remembers, included many guests. Sunday night, being family night there might be only six or eight extra places set. At those dinners, Eleanor Roosevelt scrambled the eggs and made French dressing at the table. However, Mrs. Dorothy Roosevelt said, Eleanor Roosevelt was no chef, because she just did not have the time.

Mrs. Dorothy Roosevelt was invited again in 1938 to perform in Washington with the National Symphony Orchestra at a summer concert held at Water Gate.

**IN ANSWER** to a question as to the musical tastes of the first family, Mrs. Roosevelt said that they were not music patrons. Eleanor Roosevelt liked the "Blue Danube" and he, "Home on the Range," but their love was books and reading and their concern, humanity.

Eleanor Roosevelt, according to Mrs. Dorothy Roosevelt, had a terrific drive to do good and was way ahead of her time in the field of social legislation, in which she was impatient to see progress more rapidly.

In 1940 the first lady asked her sister-in-law to present a two piano recital with Loraine McDonald, then of Birmingham, in the East Room.

**AS TO THE** role of the first lady in the White House, Mrs. Roosevelt commented that her sister-in-law was the best organized person she had ever known. She would arise at 8 a.m. and, during the early years in the White House, go horseback riding in the park before breakfast.

She had housekeepers and secretaries to alleviate her work load but many nights she was still at her desk at 2 a.m. poring over her mail.

To do so much in a day, Mrs. Dorothy Roosevelt explained, her activities proceeded as clockwork. She had, she said, the happy faculty of being able to drop off to sleep and catnap in what ever mode of transportation she was traveling in, awaking refreshed at her destination.

**ASKED ONE** time what were her favorite hats, the first lady replied, "My favorite hats are those I can sleep in."

Accompanying Mrs. Roosevelt on one Washington trip was Mrs. Wallace Frost of Birmingham. Mrs. Frost's son, Jon, was stationed at Ft. Myers at that time and Eleanor Roosevelt also invited him to stay at the White House as a guest.

In the fall of 1943 Eleanor Roosevelt came to Detroit and visited in the Waddington Road home of the White House. Her mission was to visit Detroit's plants and study means of helping women in the war effort.

Mrs. Dorothy Roosevelt remembers that on their tour the "White" at the machines would shout, "Eleanor!"

**DURING THAT** visit, which followed the Detroit race riots, Mrs. Dorothy Roosevelt recalled that the first lady brushed aside the fears of others and spoke in the Negro section of Detroit to a Negro audience.

After the president's death, the trips between the two continued with as much constancy but now between New York and Hyde Park.

Mrs. Dorothy Roosevelt recalled one of her last visits with Eleanor Roosevelt, one that took place in her New York apartment. To illustrate the wide variety of guests her hostess entertained and her varied fields of interest, the luncheon guest that noon, she reported, was an African from Kenya who had come to this country to raise money for saving the wild life in his country.

Among Mrs. Roosevelt's memories of the first family is a picture of Eleanor Roosevelt, attired in formal wear, presented to her when she played at the White House in 1936.
