BOHN IN North Hampton, Mass., Gare was the youngest of four children. His family still operates the oldest jewelry store in New England. It has been in the Gare family since the early 1800's.
Since coming to Birmingham, Gare has seen the town grow from a community of 13,000 to over 250,000.
"I believe the biggest change has been in the cooperation with the surrounding communities," Alvey said. "Horace E. Shelton, a self-styled city, we are continually working with neighboring towns to maintain and improve municipal facilities and services."

GARE DESCRIBES the future of Birmingham in one word: "Excellent!"
He cautioned, however, that the community must remain alert.
"The people are going to have to work to keep the high type of city they have. They must hold the residential attractiveness and the business area must keep its special touch," he said.

Although he has no definite plans for the future, Gare and his wife, Margaret, plan to spend much of the time traveling to both the United States and abroad.
"We haven't seen a tenth of this country that we'd like to," he said.
AN AVID fisherman and a three-or-four-times-a-year golfer, Gare also expects to devote much of his leisure time to his cottage at Higgins Lake.
When asked if he'd enter governmental work if he was starting out again, Gare leaned back, smiled, ran his hand over his close-cropped hair in his familiar fashion and said: "Sure, it really gets into your
