Author-Lecturer to Open St. Thomas More Series

Author-lecturer Ronald J. Thorman will discuss the challenge and responsibility of the layman in today's world at 8 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 10, in St. Thomas More church, 411 Adams road north of Wattle, Troy. His appearance marks the start of this season's Tuesday Forum series.

Thorman, whose book "The Emerging Layman" (Doubleday, 1962) was chosen as a selection by four Catholic book clubs, has taught sociology and papal social encyclicals to graduates and undergraduate levels at Loyola University, Chicago.

Thorman, who has been published editor of St. Thomas More magazine, Thorman has been publisher and director of development for the Spiritual Life Institute of America. A frequent speaker before lay and clerical groups, his broadcast appearances include CBS-TV's "Lamp Unto My Feet."

St. Paul's Travels Will Be Subject Of Lecture Series

Ground-breaking ceremonies for the final building phase of the Episcopal Church of the Advent, 3225 Middlebelt Road, Orchard Lake, will take place Sunday morning.

The Rev. Herbert Meyers, rector of St. David's Church in Southfield, representing Bishop Richard Enrich, will preach the sermon at the regular 10 a.m. service which will be held in what will be the multi-purpose room of the completed church.

FOLLOWING THE sermon, the congregation will form in procession and file outside for the symbolic first spading of earth. Members of the vestry will measure out the boundaries of the church.

Attending the ceremony will be representatives of the architects, Kainlauri, MacCallum & Millam Associates, of Ann Arbor, and the contractors, Wallace Construction Co. of Detroit.

The congregation of the Church of the Advent was founded in 1955, and until the temporary nave was finished in 1959, services were held in the old Pine Lake school building at Long Lake Road and Middlebelt.

At first the church was a mission of Christ Church Cranbrook in Bloomfield Hills, but since 1961 has been a parish in its own right.
