**B'HAM COUNCIL**

"Birmingham has some of the best in the world in the United States," according to Carl G. Wonnberger, head of the English Department at Cranbrook School, who spoke at the meeting of the Birmingham Council of Parent-Teacher Associations at the Hill Building recently.

"I am concerned about the school that is concerned with curriculum. Curriculum becomes a mosaic code and human sacrifices are made to it—children," he declared.

Prof. Wonnberger admonished teachers to put the curriculum in a drawer and lose it. He believes that teachers should do a custom job on every individual student. "Otherwise, all we do is go through the motions of education."

"A frill is something I like and you don't like. To a tone-deaf person, music is a frill and to a color blind person, art is a frill," he said.

Prof. Wonnberger, who is director of Cranbrook Summer Theatre School, said that you should expose students to as many arenas as possible and something is going to set them on fire and excite their imagination and enthusiasm.

"You can't shove them all through the same mold" he asserted.

During the business portion of the council meeting, members agreed to publicize the fact that it is traditional in Birmingham for school children to go "trick or treating" the night before Halloween so that they can go to the parade on Halloween night.
