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Michigan Machine Retains Lead in Northwood Loop

Andy Klaker powered a big 266 game to lead his L & L Shell team to a season high game of 1,034 and series of 2,940 over Torrence Oil's 775 last week in the Northwood Lanes Senior House League. First Michigan Wheelchair Games Scheduled in May

This year is an Olympic year, and for the next month or so, the world will focus its attention on Tokyo, site of the Olympic Games, as athletes from various countries seek to win a gold, silver or bronze medal.

When the extravaganza is over, another will begin, for this year there will be two Olympic Games. The athletes who participate in the second of the two will arrive and begin competition immediately after the first is over.

THE COMPETITION will be as tough, the athletes just as good and the stakes just as hard to break—with just one exception—the athletes will be in wheelchairs.

The event will be the 1964 Paralympics, an annual meeting of the world's top paralyzed athletes, held each year in England and every fourth year at the Olympic site.

A crack team of United States players, selected by the National Wheelchair Athletic Association, will be sent to Tokyo to represent this country in the 1964 Paralympics.

Among this group of athletes will be Steve Florescu, a past president of the Michigan chapter of Paralyzed Veterans and the current coordinator between the local group and the National Wheelchair Athletic Association.

FLORESCU, AN ardent believer in sports for the handicapped, is at present organizing for the first Michigan Wheelchair Games next

May, an event he hopes to promote through the efforts of Paralyzed Veterans of America, the event will be held at Detroit's Patton Park and is open to all area residents who are paralyzed and wish to enter the competition.

The purpose is to help meet the needs and develop leisure and diversion activity for the disabled and to promote health and rehabilitation through sports for the physically handicapped.

Competition in each event will be divided into three and four classes, so that all entrants will be competing against athletes registered according to degree of disability.

The games will feature swimming, table tennis, shuffleboard, soft ball, discus and bowling. Shot put, javelin, throw, slalom and archery will also be featured for special classes.

The emphasis on the games is to promote fun and enjoyment, but Florescu confesses that it is from local competition that national and international wheelchair athletes are born.

THE MICHIGAN Wheelchair Athletic Club (MICH-WACS) will promote the games in local areas. Coaching facilities and training are also provided for all interested athletes who contact the group.

All persons are required to register before Dec. 15 with the Coordinating Chairman, 10 Annual Michigan Wheelchair Games, 1466 Lafayette, Lincoln Park.

Florescu hopes to get a greater degree of participation from the area for the games. If so, he may have company on the next trip to the 1965 Paralympics.
