The council was told by City Attorney Everett Hayes that to enforce the already-existing ordinance, posting of the law would be needed at all entrances to the city.

City Administrator Jerald D. Stone was instructed to further discuss the posting with the Lathrup Police.

**Returns to Norfolk**

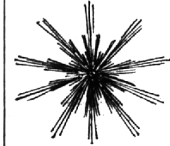

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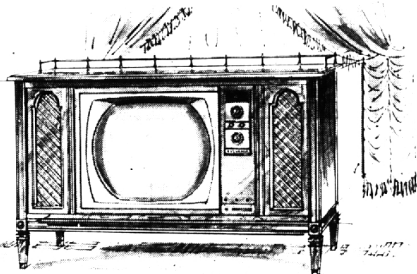


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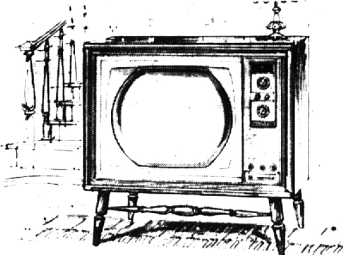
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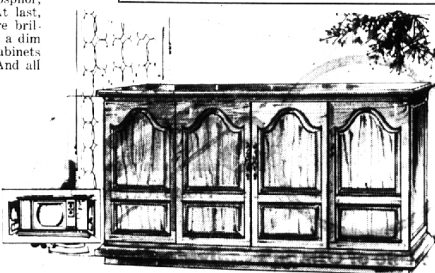
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**THE HOT 'N' KOLD SHOPS OF NORTHLAND**

**Lt. Participates In NATO Training**

First Lt. Edward M. Gormley, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. John P. Gormley, 7440 Jackson Park, Birmingham, and other members of the 3d Armored Division recently participated in Exercise PALLEX 64, an eight-day NATO directed and controlled training exercise in Germany.

The bi-annual exercise was designed to test and evaluate coordination procedures and communications within the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) military structure in Europe. Orders and communications through headquarters command posts and the dissemination of information to lower headquarters were stressed to insure maximum proficiency during the training exercise.

Lt. GORMLEY, overseas since October 1962, is regularly stationed near Frankfurt, Germany, as a platoon leader in Company C of the division's 149d Signal Battalion. He entered the Army in June 1962.

A member of Sigma Pi Epsilon and Pi Sigma Epsilon fraternities, Gormley was graduated from Campion Jesuit High School in Prairie du Chien, Wis., in 1958 and from the University of Detroit in 1962. His wife, Sharon, is with him in Germany.

Others joining panel discussions will be Dr. Bruce DeSjelder of Detroit, professor of management—"Problems of Small Business—Services Needed and Resources Available," at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, and Dr. J. Stuart Johnson, also of Detroit, dean of WSU's College of Engineering—"The State of Michigan's Research Program in Support of Industrial Growth and Expansion," at 4 p.m. Thursday.

The conference panels will feature more than 30 educational and industrial leaders from the State of Michigan. Sponsors of the conference are the Michigan Aeronautics Foundation, Wayne State University, Michigan State University, University of Detroit, University of Michigan and the Small Business Administration.

**Cong. Broomfield On Page School Study Committee**

Cong. William S. Broomfield (R-Royal Oak) was named ranking Republican on a five-man committee to study Washington's congressional pages.

The committee, named by Speaker John McCormack, was ordered to report back to the House of Representatives. Its recommendations on minimum age, supervision, educational requirements and whether a school and permanent quarters should be provided for the 400 a month congressional messenger boys.

Broomfield has been a critic of the lack of supervision, "spoliation system" selection and the racial discrimination within the ranks of the 80 pages who run errands for the House, Senate and Supreme Court.

**HE HAS URGED** nationwide competitive examinations, supervised housing and compulsory study hours and curfews for the youths, many of whom are in their early teens.

Broomfield said there have been some incidents involving page boys, "but it's a wonder there haven't been more. These boys are permitted to live pretty much where they please and do as they please, and many of them are making almost as much money as their fathers."

No Negroes serve as pages in either the House or Senate.

**BROOMFIELD SAID** that rates are selected "arbitrarily on the basis of political patronage and with little or no consideration of grades, study habits or moral character."

He said the congressional page school should be "a sort of academy in government and politics, awarded on the basis of achievement and aptitude rather than a Federally-financed method of paying off past political debts by the party in power."

Congressman Edith Green of Oregon will be chairman of the committee. Besides Broomfield, others are Sam Gibbons of Florida, Charles H. Wilson of California and Willard Curtin of Pennsylvania.

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
