Ford Motor Co. Promotes Three Area Executives

Marvin I. Katke, 1301 Kirkway, Bloomfield Hills, has been appointed vice president-manufacturing Ford Motor Co., Henry Ford II, chairman of the board, announced Wednesday.

Ford said the appointment was made in view of the company's current world-wide expansion program. The position of vice president-manufacturing was held last by John Dykstra, also an area resident, from 1958 until he was elected company president in 1961.

Katke will report to Charles H. Patterson, executive vice president, who will continue as a member of the operating policy committee and the finance committee.

The company's board of directors elected Robert Stevenson, 18780 San Diego, Lathrup, a vice president succeeding Katke as vice president-engine, transmission and class group.

Clinton I. York, 6790 Castle Drive, Birmingham, was appointed general manager of the Transmission and Chassis Division, succeeding Stevenson.

also opened a Royal Oak office. "I was interested only in gathering support from the Birmingham area but it has grown to include the entire county," Johnston said.

MRS. ARTHUR Schlesinger, Jr., wife of the Harvard historian and top-ranking advisor to the late President John F. Kennedy, will lead a team of "Ladies for Lyndon" into Birmingham next week.

The Birmingham Democratic Club will host the group at a meeting at 8 p.m. Tuesday at The Community House. Also in the program are scheduled appearances of Democratic candidates for county, state and national offices.

Candidates for the nonpartisan judicial races have also been invited to take part in the program. Another organization, called the Oakland County Women for Johnson, has set up headquarters at 114 W. Maple in Birmingham.

While there will be no local propositions on the Birmingham ballot, voters will be asked to approve or reject the so-called "Massachusetts Bailout."

If approved, the act would eliminate state property taxes and require a separate vote for each candidate voted for. It also requires that in general elections candidates' names be grouped under office titles rather than under party headings as is the present system.

Local election officials have reported that many residents have asked the proper procedures to be followed in splitting a ballot.

BIRMINGHAM City Clerk Irene Hanley gave this explanation: "A mixed ballot is one where no lever is pulled at the heading of any party column but there will be levers pulled behind the candidate of more than one party."

"A split ticket is one where a lever has been pulled at the top of a party column and in addition levers have been pulled before the names of candidates in other party columns."

Miss Hanley also reported that the 15,730 registered voters in Birmingham is the largest number recorded here.

The 355 persons processed by her office on the last day of registration was also a record.

COMMENT ON the election, Birmingham Mayor Charles W. Renfrew called the campaign on the national level "skillful" but he had nothing but praise for the state race and Gov. George Romney in particular.

"The presidential nominees have not held a discussion on the merit of national issues. The campaign has been nothing but a battle of personalities," Renfrew said. "Gov. Romney, on the other hand, has handled things in a proper manner," he said.

A Family Day will close the week on Saturday, Oct. 24, with special entertainment for children, including a football game (WSU vs. Eastern Michigan), an Alumni Open House, and the Mackenzie Union's "Governors' Ball" at Cole Hall.

On Sept. 27, she again appeared in full recital at Indiana University at Bloomington, Ind. Beverly has entered the Chopin International Festival Competition at Warsaw, Poland, early in 1965 where young pianists of the world will gather.

City Delays Chester Area Relief Sewer

Construction of a relief sewer in the Chester-Wallace section of the city has been postponed indefinitely by Birmingham commissioners.

The estimated cost of such a project had been set at \$180,000. Commissioners had been considering the construction of sewer in the area generally bounded by Southfield, Pierce and Lincoln.

A PROPERTY owner in the area, Henry Fenski, had petitioned the commission to hold a hearing on the necessity of the project after he had had repeated problems with his sewer at 381-387 W. Brown.

At a hearing of necessity on a similar petition of Fenski's in June 1962 the commission had declared no necessity.

Dozens of residents of the area, many of the elderly, appeared before the commission Monday night to protest the project but did not have to state their case.

Mayor Charles W. Renfrew said an alternate solution would be worked out between Fenski and the engineering department. The other residents said they had had no sewer problems.

CITY ENGINEER William T. Killeen said he thought the Fenski property could be connected to a sanitary sewer which depends on about 100 feet south of the land.

"There is also a sanitary sewer in Brown Street, to which a connection could be made," Killeen said. "From the information we have it appears that either sewer would be deep enough and adequate."

The \$700 to \$1,000 cost of the hook-up will be paid for by Fenski, but if the sewer continues to cause trouble, the city will reimburse him and other solutions will be studied.

Mayor Renfrew told the audience he could not guarantee that the possibility of constructing the new sewer would not come before the commission again.
