The next game will be on Oct. 16 at Grosse Pointe University School. Also scheduled are games with Bloomfield Hills Convent and Grosse Pointe Convent.

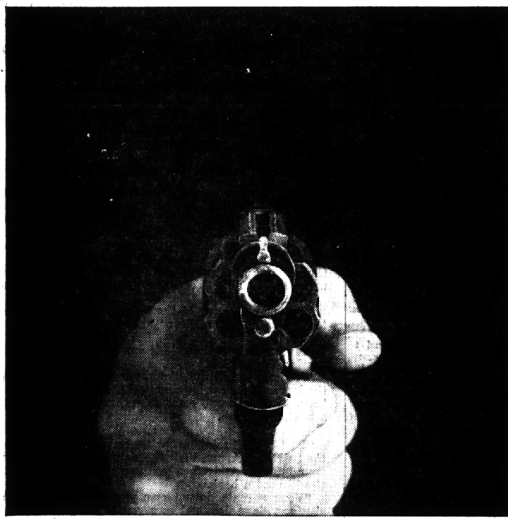
Kingswood will also participate
