# Seaholm's AFS Students Enjoy Stay in Birmingham

On Sept. 30, Seaholm High School held its annual American Field Service Night.

The purpose of the meeting was to introduce the new AFS exchange students and to explain the AFS program to prospective juniors interested either in going abroad or hosting a foreign student next year.

Pat Irvin, chairman of the American Field Service steering committee, introduced Seaholm's 1964-65 students, Regula Allenspach and Federico Olliveri, to the parents and students attending the meeting.

REGULA CAME to Seaholm from Winterberg, which is in the German section of Switzerland. Her father works for the Nestle Co. there, and is always trying out new recipes on the family.

Horseback-riding is Regula's favorite sport, but she also enjoys skiing. In Winterberg she is the leader of a Wolf Pack for boys, like the Cub Scout program here. Regula's American sister is Kathy Davis, 1342 Fairway.

Federico comes from Turin, Italy, where his father works for the Fiat Co. He is an avid tennis player and also enjoys swimming and skiing, and hopes to participate in these sports at Seaholm. His American brother is Mark Waterman, 4255 Meadow Lane.

ALTHOUGH exchange students are not allowed to make speeches until after Christ-

mas because of possible difficulties with English, both Regula and Federico expressed great pleasure over their stay so far.

Kathy Kennedy, the only Seaholm student who participated in the AFS program last summer, spoke and showed slides of her Chinese family in Singapore.

There were five children in the family, but one daughter has not been home for three years because she is a student at the University of Michigan. The sister Kathy's age, Chung, is now an AFS exchange student for a year in the United States.

AFS faculty advisers Mrs. Carol Darling and Miss Mary Campbell explained the American Field Service program.

The organization started World War I and was also active in World War II. It then became an exchange program, and the first group of 17 students came over from Europe in 1947.

TODAY THERE are 62 different countries participating in the program. A total of 700 American students were sent abroad on AFS last summer alone.

There have been 21 AFS students at Seaholm from all over Europe since the program began. They money to bring them here is raised by the Seaholm students during the week-long AFS-YFU drive in the early spring each year.

Mrs. Darling also announced that Mr. Stephen Galatti, founder and director of the American Field Service, died recently. The organization is presently without a director, but a new one will be appointed soon.



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
