Show Children's Art At B'ham Unitarian

An exhibition of art by children from all over the world was shown at the Birmingham Unitarian Church on Sunday. The same exhibit was recently on display at Brookside School Cranbrook.

This collection of pictures, sponsored locally by the Oakland County Branch of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, was obtained from Art for World Friendship, an organization with headquarters in Medford, Pa., which was established in 1946 with the aim of bringing an understanding between children of differing cultures throughout the world.

CHILDREN FROM 70 countries are now participating on a group basis. Pictures are sent to the international headquarters by teachers, Scout leaders, or other interested adults.

An equal exchange of pictures by children of the same ages and from other countries is sent to the group leaders to be distributed to the participating children.

Each child receives a picture of his own from another country with information on the back giving the name, address, age and country of the child who made it. Many pen pals and friendships result.

Some of the pictures are internationally mounted to make an international collection, such as the one shown at the Birmingham Unitarian Church. Art for World Friendship is recognized by the U. S. State Department, as well as in embassies throughout the world. UNICEF, UNESCO, Voice of America and other organizations.
