Madame Suzek will speak of the history of chafing and its many uses to the hostess for entertaining.

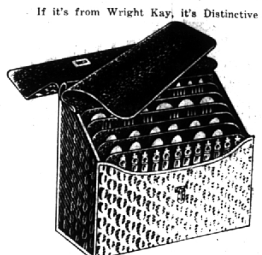

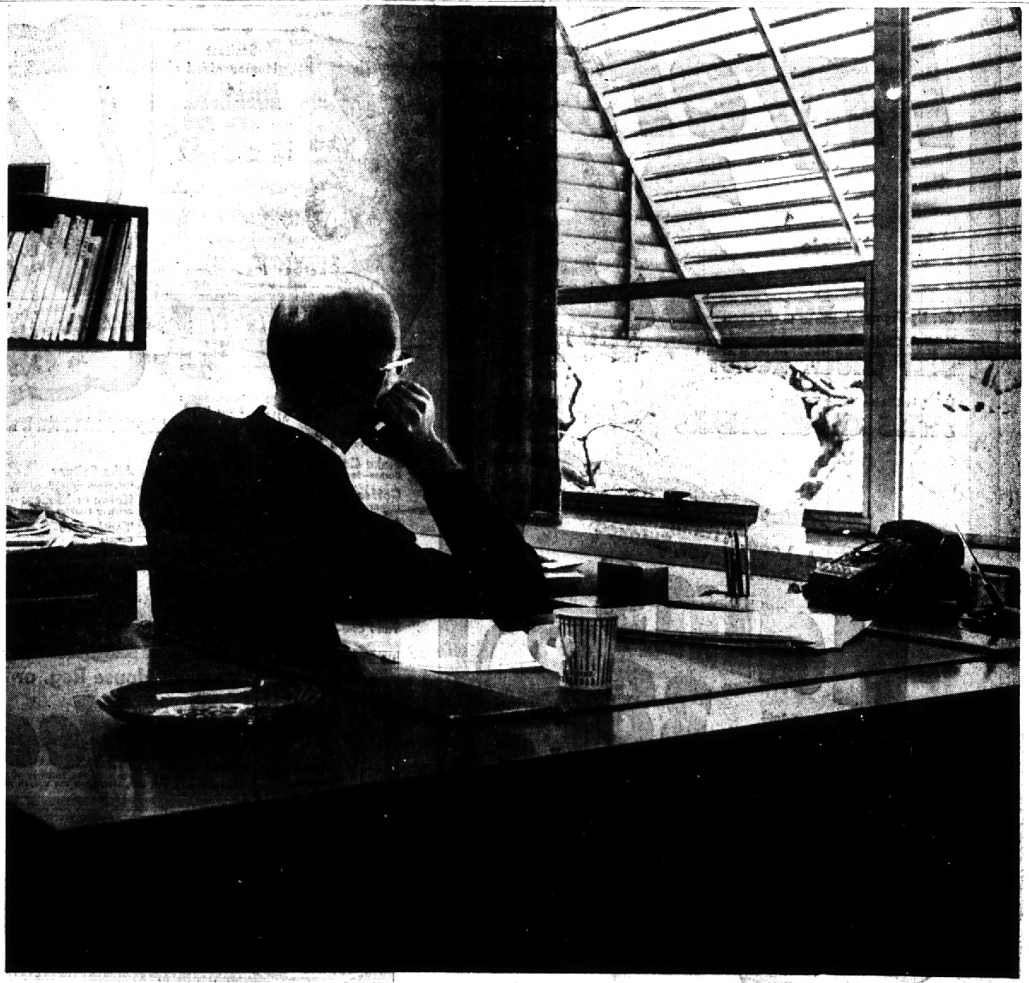
