Seaholm Trips Southfield, 35-12

Big 4th Period Clinches Game

Seaholm, hanging on to a 14-0 lead in the fourth quarter, scored three final period touchdowns to defeat a game Southfield eleven, 35-12, Friday night and square its Southeastern Michigan Association record at 1-1.

The Maples, picking up their third victory in four starts, held only a 7-0 lead at halftime, but rallied their forces in the last quarter and handed the Blue Jays their third loss of the campaign.

Seaholm started slow and gained momentum as they went along. They outtrashed Southfield 222-47 yards, but had to compete with a Blue Jay passing attack that netted 158 yards through the air.

SOUTHFIELD QUARTERBACK Ted Simmons threw 21 passes in the second quarter alone, but couldn't get the Jay offense moving until the fourth quarter when Southfield struck for two quick TD's.

But, while Southfield was trying to narrow the gap, the Maples' things into their own hands and moved for three touchdowns to offset the last quarter rally by the Jays.

Maple halfback Buzz Downey provided the spark for Seaholm's offensive show. The senior speedster rambled for two touchdowns, one on a 38-yard pass interception in the last period.

Senior quarterback Dick Swaney got the first score of the evening when he engineered a Maple drive down to the four yardline and dove over from that point. Mike Lawrie added his first of five straight conversions.

In the third quarter, Downey scored his first touchdown of the evening when he scooted 75 yards on a trap play to up Seaholm's lead to 14-0.

SOUTHFIELD STILL, in the ball game, got into a hole early in the final period on a short punt. The Maples marched 10 yards to paydirt, with fullback Tom Marsh plunging the final four yards.

With a little over nine minutes left, the Jays went to the air but a Simmons' pass fell into Downey's arms and the Maple back raced.

CLARENVILLE closed the gap to 12-6 when a 50-yard pass from Danny Frock fell into the hands of Chris Hawkins for a TD. They were on West Bloomfield's 10 when the clock ran out.

Barnes scored his second league victory over winless Brighton, 21-7, behind the power running of fullback Bill Barnes.

Barnes scored two touchdowns and added a pair of extra points to spark the Bloomfield Hills attack. The Barons scored in all but the second stanza.

BARNES OPENED the scoring when he scored on a four-yard run to climax a 60-yard drive. He ran for the PAT. The Hills made it 14-0 on a scoring pass from quarterback Hugh Carney to Gary Fischer that covered four yards in the third period. Barnes ran for the extra point.

Bob Larabee narrowed the count to 14-7 when he sprinted 57 yards to score, but Barnes got it back when he dove over from the one in the final quarter. Mike Krautz added the PAT.

ASSOCIATED with Gary in organizing and developing the new club are Don Brown, tennis pro at Pine Lake Country Club during the summer, who will serve in the same capacity at the new club during the winter months; Glenn H. Frick, Jr., Detroit industrialist and tennis enthusiast; and Mrs. Webster Buell, Birmingham tennis enthusiast who will serve as membership chairman for the Bloomfield Tennis House.

With his associates, Gary also is studying plans for construction in the Detroit area of two other clubs similar to the Bloomfield Tennis House. They would be located in Grosse Pointe and downtown Detroit and members of each club would receive guest privileges at the other two clubs.

IN ADDITION to four tennis courts, the new indoor club will contain shower rooms, a sauna bath, private lockers and a lounge room. The lounge room, furnished with sofas and chairs, will be for the convenience of club members waiting their turn on the courts and for children of members who are using the courts.

A "Child's Corner" in the new clubhouse will be located across from Berz Airport.

Falcons Suffer 38-0 Setback To Raiders

Groves, defending Northwest Suburban League football champ, suffered its worst defeat in several years as North Farmington rolled to a 38-0 league victory Saturday night at Seaholm field.

The Falcons, after battling the Raiders through a scoreless first half, fell completely apart as the winners scored three times in the third quarter and added 17 points in the fourth.

OUTGAINED in the ball game, 348-149 yards, the Falcons now stand 0-2 in league play. John McDonald broke the ice when he scored on a 20-yard romp early in the third stanza.

Bill Oldershaw plunged in from the one and Tom Trausch covered 15 yards to score another in the same period. Trausch converted all three extra points.

The Raiders could do no wrong in the last half. Jim Cocksels and Andy Lanning posted six-pointers for the winners in the final period, while both players ran for 158 yards.

Trausch completed the rout by booting a 15-yard field goal late in the fourth quarter.

North Farmington had 12 first downs in the contest as compared to Groves' five. The Raiders completed 7 of 30 passes for 158 yards, while the Falcons hit on 6 of 20 for 41.

Plan Indoor Tennis Club for Area

Tennis will become a year-round sport in the Birmingham-Bloomfield area this winter with the opening of the Bloomfield Tennis House, a semi-private club sponsored by a group of Detroit area tennis enthusiasts and Wyndham F. Gary, Milwaukee architect and real estate developer.

Construction of the new club house, which will contain four, standard-sized, cork composition indoor courts, will begin immediately on a site opposite Berz Airport on E. Maple, halfway between Crooks Rd. and Colledge Rd. in Troy.

The new, all-steel clubhouse is expected to be completed by Jan. 1, 1965, when club members can begin using its facilities.

PLANS FOR THE new tennis club were announced Wednesday, during a press conference at the Birmingham Athletic Club, which also was attended by tennis pros from Detroit area private clubs, and tennis chairman.

Gary organized and developed the now-flourishing, four-court, indoor Milwaukee Tennis Club, as well as two outdoor tennis and swimming clubs, the Lake Shore Club in Milwaukee and the North Shore Club in Racine, Wis.
