

City Buys 900 Tons Of Salt For Winter

Winter winds and icy roads are on the way. Birmingham commissioners Monday night authorized the purchase of 900 tons of salt from the Diamond Crystal Co. for use on city streets. The purchase price was set at \$6.40 a ton.

Although the bid of the International Salt Co. was the same as Diamond Crystal's, DPW Supt. T. C. Brien recommended the latter. Brien said he preferred to use salt that had been stored indoors rather than piled out-of-doors.

U-M Medicine Studies Sight

Serious visual handicaps are often exaggerated conditions of "normal" eye characteristics, says a University of Michigan researcher.

Take colorblindness, for example. Totally colorblind individuals see only black, white and shades of gray. But by examining them, scientists are learning more about the intricate mechanisms which enable the normal person to distinguish different colors.

This is one of the areas being explored in the U-M Vision Research Laboratories, headed by Dr. Mathew Alpern.

PSYCHOLOGISTS and physiologists in the laboratories are probing such other facets of human vision as:

- Contrast perception: Why does a gray square on a black surface appear lighter than the same square on a white background?
- Seeing in the dark.
- The "smudging" of an image as it is formed in the retina.

To pursue these studies, the lab employs some of the most sophisticated apparatus in the U-M Medical Center.

Dr. Thomas Aiba uses contact lenses, wired to electronic computers, to measure the electrical responses of the eye to a blinking light. An apparatus called a pupilometer is now being designed according to U-M specifications.

IT WILL take the place of a camera to record and measure change in pupil size following a flash of light. The vision researchers will use it to assemble data on why shorter light flashes appear brighter than longer ones.

The device will be purchased by funds from a \$48,000 U.S. Public Health Service research grant. The researchers' goal is to find new knowledge of human vision which can be applied to help people with visual defects.

Since 1968 Dr. Alpern and Gilbert Lee, Jr., research associate in University Hospital's ophthalmology department, have screened more than 1000 patients who have been under treatment in the department. Dr. Harold F. Falls directs the ophthalmological aspects of the project.

Patients whose visual problems appear to be "the most informative" for the studies are invited to participate, Dr. Alpern says. Some research funds are used to compensate individuals for their loss from work and missed meals because of the projects and to cover their transportation to the Medical Center for the research tests.
