City Discusses Spring Paving Of Southlawn

Birmingham city commissioners Monday night declared necessity for the paving of Southlawn from Pierce to Edgewood.

The \$12,300 estimated cost of the project will be split on an 85-15 per cent basis with the benefitting property owners paying the larger amount.

Commissioners delayed the spreading of the assessment roll until March 1, 1965, because the project will not begin before next spring's construction season.

City Engineer William T. Killen said the street has a 60-foot right-of-way and plans call for the construction of a 29-foot pavement. He estimated the assessment cost at \$8.32 per foot.

Previous attempts to have Southlawn paved have failed primarily because of property owners' opposition.

A teen-age boy is being sought by police in connection with a purse snatching that took place in Birmingham Friday night.

Mrs. Helen Wilbur, 4761 Cimmaron, Bloomfield Township, told Birmingham police she was attacked by a 15 or 16-year old boy who she left her car on N. Glenhurst.

Mrs. Wilbur, a nurse, said she was about to go on duty at the home of Charles Tenton, 1011 N. Glenhurst, when the attack occurred.

As she got out of her car parked in the Tenton driveway the youth struck her on the head with his fist and grabbed the purse containing \$35.

Mrs. Wilbur said the boy then jumped into a waiting car parked across the street and fled. She described him as being tall and slender.
