A visitor from Spain spent some

time at Derby on Thursday, Oct. 8. Mrs. Navarro, a native of Valencia, Spain, spoke to all the Spanish students sixth hour in the gym.

She began her study of the French language in high school at the age of fourteen. After going to a private school to improve her English, she went to college to major in the language.

Derby students were interested to find that school hours in Valencia are much the same as ours, only their day begins later (9 a.m.), and a holiday meal is an hour long (2 p.m.) and the day ends at 5:30 p.m.

As to the Spanish people's opinions of Americans, Mrs. Navarro said, "In America there is more freedom than in Spain. But children do begin dating at 14 or 15, generally, and they have no chaperones." In Spain, one has to be 21 to drive a car.

When asked about the reactions of her people when President Kennedy was assassinated, Mrs. Navarro could only relate her own: "I cried."

She showed some dolls in festive Spanish dress and demonstrated the use of the castanets. John Zimmerman and Paul Anderson presented a dramatic in Spanish for the assembly.

Derby's enrollment this year is 1,070, as compared to 1,064 last year. Of this year's total, 742 are seventh graders, 299 are eighth graders and the remaining 422 are ninth graders.

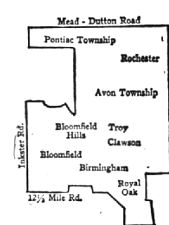

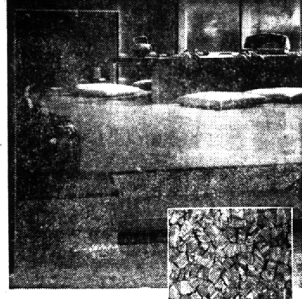

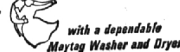
