First Baptist to Hear Mission Leader Speak

The Rev. Newton E. Woodbury executive director of the American Baptist Convention's Division of World Mission Support, will speak at the First Baptist Church, Birmingham, on Sunday, Oct. 25 at 11 a.m. on "The Mission Becomes the Church."

As director of the Division, Mr. Woodbury is responsible for the basic fund-raising program of the American Baptist Convention, with a 1964 goal of \$11,680,000 for the total denominational mission program.

The Division produces and distributes films and filmstrips and assigns missionaries and denominational leaders to interpret American Baptist Mission work in local churches and area meetings.

THIS PAST SUMMER Mr. Woodbury, accompanied by his wife completed a three-month world tour to gain first-hand knowledge of the denomination's overseas mission work in Europe, Congo, India, Burma, Thailand, Philippines, Hong Kong and Japan.

Prior to becoming executive director in June, 1959, Mr. Woodbury was a member of the field staff of the Division of World Mission Support for seven years, serving as state director in Massachusetts and later as regional counselor for New England.

A native of Lowell, Mass., Mr. Woodbury is a graduate of the University of Redlands, Redlands, Cal. and Andover Newton Theological School, Newton Centre, Mass.

He was ordained in Worcester, Mass., in 1939, and held pastorates in Worcester and Holden, Mass. In 1946 he joined the staff of the Massachusetts Baptist Convention as director of Town and Country Work from which position he entered the department of field counseling.

Rev. Woodbury took a copy of the New Testament from the First Baptist Church with him on his world tour. At each Mission
