Suffragan Bishop Of Philippines At St. James

The Rt. Rev. Edward Longid, Suffragan Bishop of the Philippines, will be the speaker at St. James Episcopal Churchwomen's luncheon meeting Wednesday, Oct. 28, in the Undercroft of the church.

Born in Tagaytay, Philippines, and educated at St. Andrew's Theological Seminary, Bishop Longid was ordained a deacon in 1932 and served in this position at the Mission of St. Michael and All Angels in the Philippines.

He was active in missionary work during World War II and following this, was ordained a priest in Tadian, Philippines, in February, 1963, he was consecrated Suffragan Bishop of the Philippines.

PRESENTLY, HE is attending the General Convention of the Episcopal Church in St. Louis as a member of the House of Bishops.

Renowned as a prominent speaker in the Episcopal Church, Bishop Longid will talk on his missionary work in the Philippines.

The city plan commission hopes to have a fairly workable "master plan" for Birmingham by the end of next summer. It was disclosed last week at a meeting of the group.

The plan commission at this meeting approved the employment of Charles Barr of Michigan State College to do most of the work. Between now and next summer, Barr will meet with commission members to learn what the city has in mind for future development.

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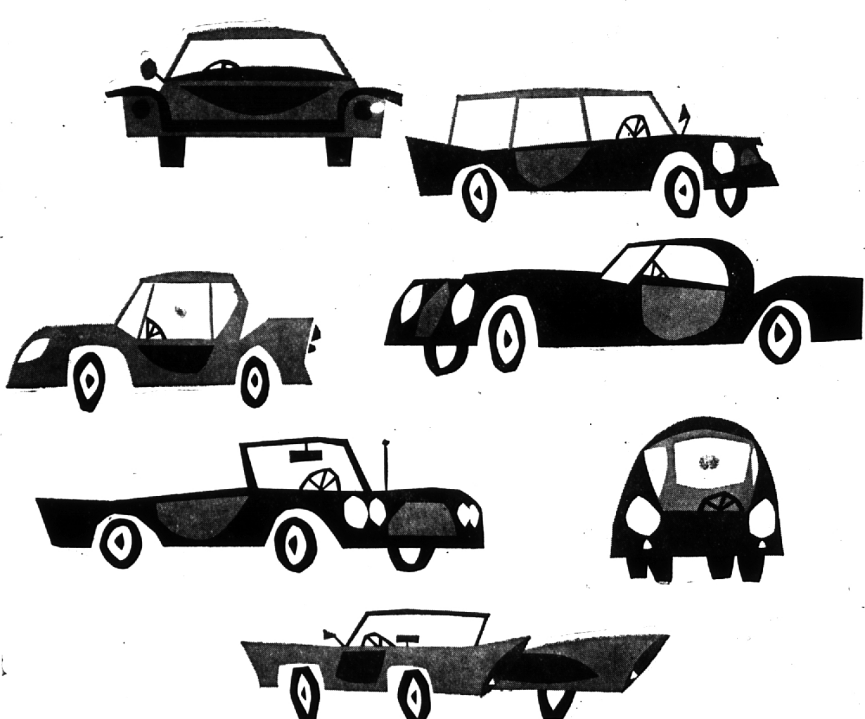
