

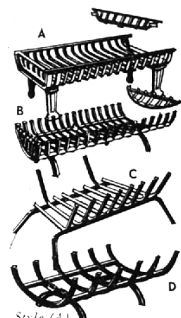
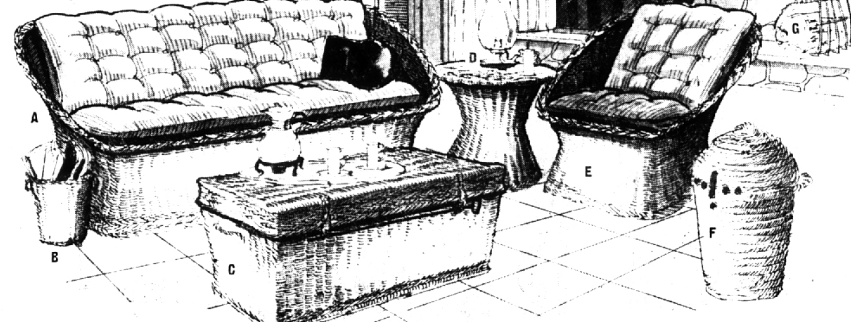

Police Plan Radar Use On Franklin Roads

FRANKLIN—Radar will be used to help control speeders on Franklin's newly paved roads.

A ten pound, two component unit was approved for purchase by Franklin's Volunteer Police Oct. 12. After receiving two bids, the council authorized the expenditure of \$1295 for the device, a Stevenson Speedolizer, which best met the police specifications.

THE INSTRUMENT has a scanning range of 2000 feet, a warning buzzer and locking device which "freezes" the dial at maximum speeds recorded. Considered to be the most modern unit available, the radar instrument will be used by Franklin police after training has been given.

Street Commissioner Donald Koch submitted a report detailing the completion of the 1964 road construction program with the final phase, gravel shoulders, about 25 per cent complete.

As road shoulders are being gravelled, Koch explains their purpose. "The gravel against the sides of the asphalt gives more strength than topsoil and thus prevents breaking off of the edges. Gravel does the best job of carrying water away from the edge of the road and preventing water from getting under the edge in winter to cause frost heaves."

DEPENDING THE use of gravel for shoulders in the view of several complaints from residents, Koch continued, "gravel is safer for cars wheels which might go off the hard pavement during wet seasons."

His report assured the council that seed or sod will grow well in the gravel and residents desiring laws to the roadside could proceed to seed. Topsoil has been spread over abandoned roadways and they will be seeded this fall.

VILLAGE president Richard Oberschulte urged the council to renew consideration of sewer and water services. "Even though the sewer proposal resulted in utter chaos a two years ago," Oberschulte said, "I do think we should continue to seek means of protecting ourselves from being excluded from ever being able to use the facility if we need it."

Building inspection fees are under review by councilmen Robert Cornille and Robert Mitchell. Cornille recommended adoption of the same rates currently used in Beverly Hills, but further study will be made.

Two gas street post-lamps will be installed in front of and to the side of the village office. The fixtures are a gift of the Coramers Power company in appreciation for the franchise granted several years ago. The village will assume the cost of installation.

ORDINANCE THREE regulating the use of weapons and firearms within the village limits is being revised with help of a police committee and will be offered for council approval in November.

Oberschulte startled his colleagues Monday night by announcing the appointment of chairman of Michigan Week, to be held in May. "I read that Birmingham named their chairman already and decided that Franklin could do a better job of planning if we got going earlier this time," he said. Jack Roberts was appointed.

Plans also are being made for a Memorial Day ceremony honoring Franklin's war veterans. Oberschulte suggested the Franklin Community Association organize Scouts for brief services in the Franklin Cemetery with an official flag grave decoration. Individuals from the cemetery association have been placing flags on graves in the past. The flags have been donated by the Southfield Veterans Post.

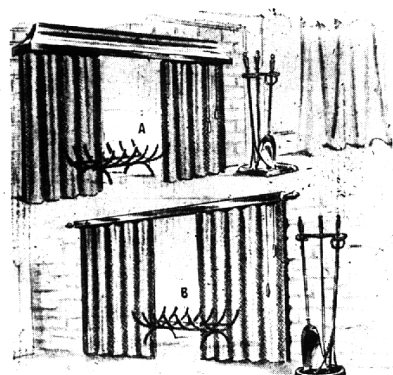

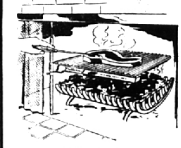

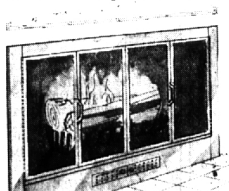
