Rummage Sale Is Planned By Holy Name

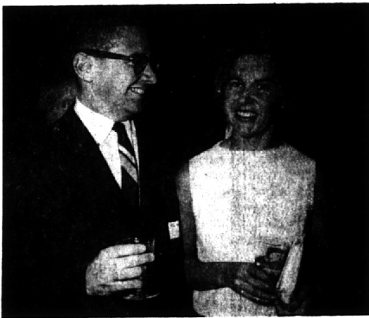

John, trumpet player since the tender age of nine, is not only "Sammy" but also playing for Edie Gorme at the Copa Cabana.
