

Scouts Hold Olympic Games

With the eyes of sports fans all across America turned to the 1964 Olympic Games now underway in Tokyo, Japan, residents will learn that special Explorer-Olympic games for members of all Explorer Posts, Ships and Squads in the Detroit Area Scout Council will be held on October 23, 24, 25 at the Charles Howell Scout Reservation at Brighton, Mich.

Included on the weekend Explorer-Olympic program for the high school age Explorers from this and other communities in Okla and Wayne and Macomb Counties will be such Olympic-type events as the 100, 200 and 400-yard dashes, and for Explorers with more endurance the 880 and a one-mile relay are included.

High jumping and broad jump-

ing events will also test the physical fitness of the Explorers.

LIKE THE WINTER Olympic games in Tokyo, certain water sports are included on the Explorer-Olympics schedule, including canoe and rowboat racing.

The Explorers will do their regular Olympic counterparts one better when it comes to the outdoor aspect of the games, because they will bring their own tents and food to the games, camping and cooking out over the weekend.

With pleasant Indian summer days here, the event should attract several hundred young men from this area. Visitors are invited to drive out to the Scout Reservation on Saturday and view the Explorer-Olympics. The camp is located south of Brighton and is reached by using Hamburg Road.

Writer From Vermont Sides With Goldwater

To the Editor: "The current choice is between sanity and insanity." You are so right, Mr. Lyman.

Obviously, Barry Goldwater must be insane. What else could he be voting no on a civil rights bill that he believed to be unconstitutional? He agrees that something should be done about the sad situation of the American Negro, but he does not know of any law that gives the government the right to tell us what friends we may have, or one that prohibits country clubs or fraternities or even private business from being selective.

If that isn't bad enough, Goldwater doesn't agree with the present plans for social security. He believes that over-extension of the social security program could possibly bring it to its end. He says that after such a system begins taking more than 10 per cent of a person's income, it does more harm than good.

GOLDWATER believes that the insurance companies of our nation could offer a health insurance program for the aged that would cost less and give more benefits than a federally sponsored program.

His ideas for our foreign policy, believe it or not, are not aimed at World War III. What he dislikes are half-wars such as Korea and Vietnam. He dislikes pouring tremendous amounts of money and many American lives into half-efforts.

Goldwater wants a strong foreign policy. He wants to re-establish and strengthen NATO. He wants our diplomatic and military defenses to be strong enough to withstand attacks from the enemy. He is sick of throwing money to Communist fronts.

GOLDWATER agrees that poverty is a problem, but he does not believe that Johnson's anti-poverty program is the way to remove poverty. He had the guts to go to the heart of Appalachia and call Johnson's program a fraud, saying that giveaway programs are the quickest way to bankruptcy for the United States.

Sure, this "free" money looks great now, but how good will it look 10 years from now.

Mr. Lyman states that more

newspapers are supporting the Democratic ticket than ever before. Of course, they are. They must cater to the masses; that's how they survive. This is one of the reasons Goldwater is so often misquoted. An example, one of many, follows:

Goldwater once said, "For instance, we could use low-yield nuclear weapons to defoliate the underbrush in Vietnam..." He later said, "I don't think we would want to do this at this time, and I would not recommend it."

WHEN THIS story appeared in thousands of newspapers the next day, such headlines were produced as "GOLDWATER FAVORS USE OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS IN VIETNAM" and the like.

Can you imagine a Democratic reader's reaction to a newspaper that so "accurately" exposed the reader's opposite party's policy? He would be annoyed and would be first in line the next day to receive more such information.

I don't believe, though, that he would really care to read too much about Jenkins or Bobby Baker.

To summarize, basically Barry Goldwater believes in the rights and pride of the individual. The other night I was watching the Olympic Games on television, and for the first time in many years I felt a sense of pride. Americans were there fighting. They were winning and losing, but at least they were going all out to be at their best. Is it insane to want our country to be respected? That's what Barry Goldwater wants.

IT IS OFTEN said that Goldwater is trying to recreate the 18th century or some mythical past. He answers this by saying that the liberals seem to be trying to go back even further than the 18th century.

He notes that the founding fathers came to this country to escape the government control that penetrated into every aspect of their lives. The liberals, such as LBJ, are recreating that kind of government which our forefathers sought to escape.
