A new hobby of decorating with roll-on liquid color will be demonstrated at painting parties being organized by two local women. Kathleen Craig, 508 Park, Birmingham, and Eva Bologna, 1215 Savon, Beverly Hills, will show how to make designs, trace a picture or use a transfer. The 35 colors flow on from replaceable nylon ballpoint-tipped tubes and can adorn wood, tile, glass, ceramics, paper, metal, cardboard, cellophane and other materials. From 1961-63, Woody has had one-man shows in Rockland, Maine; Boston; Norfolk; and Mexico City. He was awarded a Grand Prize at the American-Mexican Cultural Institute Show in 1960.

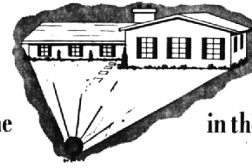
B'ham College Girl Appears in U of D Repertory Drama

Campaign Issues Will Be Debated at Campus Program

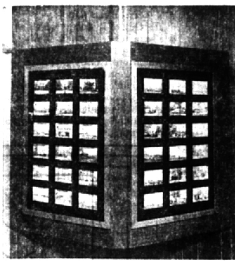
