An exhibit keyed principally for students of elementary and secondary school age is now being shown in the Young People's Art Center, Gallery of Cranbrook Academy of Art, Bloomfield Hills.

Called "Animals in Art," the exhibit presents 37 pieces from the permanent collection, which are two- and three-dimensional objects ranging in time from ancient Egypt to the present.

Media of the objects range from gold to wood and include bronze and stone. There are also drawings, prints and photos. Purposes may be religious, ritualistic or decorative, or may be nothing more than the artist feels about the subject.

To further whet the interest, the objects have humorous as well as serious approaches.

LADY BETTY FLUFF PRUNE JUICE DELIGHT

Habits seem to fall into just two categories... good and bad. And it's the good ones we all try for. A habit starts out like a cobweb, tedious and easily broken, but eventually it's a strong steel cable. So it's natural to start our children with only good habits, especially when their health is concerned.

Breakfast is one of our family's good habits, and by that, I mean that although we vary the style of eggs and the kind of cereal, we always have Lady Betty Prune Juice to start the meal. In fact, Lady Betty Prune Juice is one habit we have that was easy to start because the flavor is so rich and delicious that we all love it. 2 cups Lady Betty Prune Juice
1 envelope plain unflavored gelatin
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
1 1/2-cup package cream cheese
Soften gelatin in 1/4 cup of Lady Betty Prune Juice. Heat 1 1/4 cups of the Lady Betty Prune Juice and dissolved gelatin mix in it over very low heat. Add lemon juice and chill till partially set. Whip cream cheese with remaining 1/2 cup of prune juice and gently fold into the mixture. Chill until set in mold or small dishes.

If you'd like to add fruit to this well-drained black cherries are especially good, and if you plan to use cooked prunes as a garnish, pit and stuff them with cream cheese first.

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Artists' Clique Forms Graphics Partnership

Three Cranbrook Academy of Art graduates, along with two former students from Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, have formed a partnership called Clique Graphic.

The new company, which has offices in Royal Oak, recently completed designs for Christmas cards—two by each artist—and will offer these for the holiday season through import shops in the Birmingham area.

Members of the Clique are as follows: Steve Beck of Royal Oak, Cranbrook graduate, presently teaching art and art history at Kingswood School Cranbrook.

David C. Chesquiere, 614 Franklin Road, Birmingham, formerly a graduate student of industrial design at Wayne State University. He is a designer at Central Spray Co. in Livonia and is a Cranbrook grad.

Taeko Nakagome, 789 Ruffner, Birmingham, employed in advance studio design in the styling division of General Motors. Miss Nakagome came from Japan two years ago and studied at Cranbrook.

Roger Fleck of Royal Oak, a staff designer at Ford and Earl Design Associates in Warren, from Pratt Institute.

Danella Waters of Royal Oak, who works in interior design for the Cadillac Motor Division of General Motors.

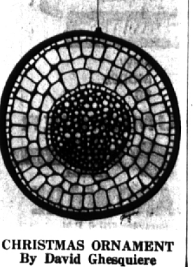
The Christmas cards are the group's first venture, but they hope to continue in other graphics projects, as a hobby.

ON TEXTURED, deckle-edge paper, the contemporary holiday designs include tree ornaments, winter scenes and religious figures. "We have tried to take a newer approach through color," said a spokesman for the group.

Color combinations range from black on ivory to magenta on green, and each card bears inside the simple statement "Peace."

All five artists worked to create the package that is a great-textured complement. Designs were prepared during the summer and printed in Detroit.

For the last three weeks, the clique has been folding and packaging its products. Cards are packaged by 10 of a single design.

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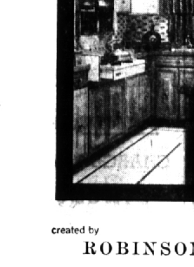

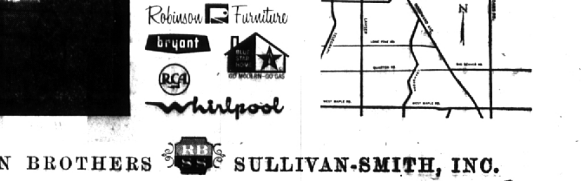


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
