

JV Squads Triumph In Football League

The Buckeyes, Wildcats and Gophers all scored victories in the junior varsity loop of the Birmingham-Bloomfield Football League Saturday.

None of the teams in the varsity division reported their scores.

The Buckeyes scored in the first quarter and then hung on to preserve a light 7-0 win over the Badgers. Dave Winter took the opening kickoff and traveled from his own 35 to the Badger five.

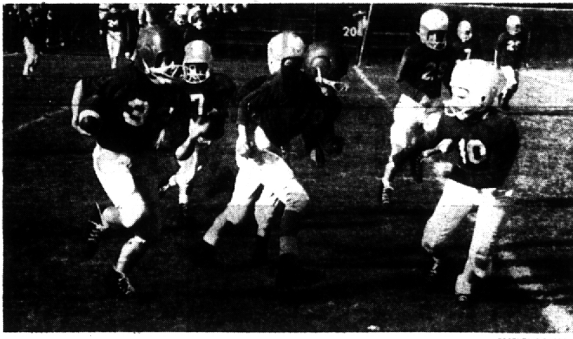
Doug Harkce made successive cracks into the line and went through right tackle on the second attempt to score. He added the extra point for the margin of victory.

In the day's highest-scoring contest, the Gophers rolled to a 32-7 victory over the Boiler-makers. The winners scored in every period to notch the victory, while the losers tallied only once in the second period.

CHRIS JOHNSON was the big man for the Gophers. He scored four of the five TD's, added an extra point and totaled 228 yards from scrimmage, along with 65 yards on runbacks of kicks.

His first two scores came in the opening quarter when he swept left and right ends for runs of 17 and 70 yards, respectively. The second was set up by a Jeff Cooke to Dave Pfister pass.

Craig Kerby tallied on a 37-yard reverse in the second quarter and Johnson added the PAT. Dan Holden scored his final TD on a 30-yard end sweep in the closing period.

THE BUCKEYES intercepted one Badger pass to stop drives, the last one set up by Keith Kern's rushing the passer.

The Wildcats earned a narrow 6-0 win over the Hawkeyes with a first-quarter touchdown by Josh Jaroszewicz.

Jaroszewicz, who has scored in every one of the Wildcats' games this year, shot 30 yards' worth from scrimmage to post the game's only score.

Kurt Burrell, Mike Hillier and ends Jamie Emery and Pete Bookmyer led the defensive action for the winners.

After the long pass completions to Kerby and Cooke in the third period, Johnson recd 38 yards for a TD and Bill Lewis got the PAT. Johnson scored his final TD on a 30-yard end sweep in the closing period.
