### Speaker Cites Public School As Culture Spot

There is no "culturally deprived" child, a Wayne State professor told Oakland County educators, Tuesday.

"The slum child has an on-going culture. It may not put him at an advantage in a larger society, but he has a culture," Dr. Herman said in a speech to the Oakland County Curriculum Council.

The public school is perhaps the only meeting place of all cultures," he said. It has the opportunity and obligation to find the good aspects of these cultures and to teach an appreciation of them.

"EVERY LESSON, whether in mathematics or English, should contain a moment of thought on how students can use what has been learned to make a better world," Dr. Herman recommended. "The first subject for teaching in a public school is a global concept of man; that one's neighbor is the African bushman as well as the family next door."

"The schools can make a far greater contribution to the development of the individual by teaching an appreciation of the value and worth of every human being rather than by drill in mathematics or grammar," he concluded.

To love to teach is one thing; to love those to whom we teach, quite another.
