EVERYONE WHO considers the citizens of other countries as brothers in humanity with whom mutual understanding and communication can be mutually beneficial.

The "patriots" see the enemy in the government because we are willing to talk to the Russians and have signed the last han treaty. They see the enemy in the churches because there is talk of love, unity and peace.
