Republican and Democratic leaders in Oakland County today predicted victories for their respective parties on the county, state and national levels in Tuesday's election.

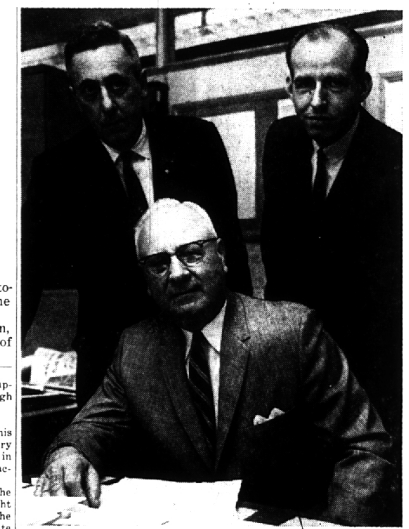

Sanity Hearing Slated Today For Gravin
