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City Postmaster Announces Rules For Yule Mail

Birmingham Postmaster Rollie Reese announced this week that Christmas parcels for Armed Services forces should be mailed no later than Nov. 10 except air mail parcels which will receive service through Dec. 1 in time for Christmas delivery.

"We recommend that parcels for distant states, be mailed no later than Dec. 5," said Reese, "and earlier if possible; local and nearby areas, no later than Dec. 15."

"Early mailing relieves congestion and insures delivery for Christmas. To assist your post office in handling of your Christmas cards, mail early and whenever possible early in the day."

"We desire that each card and parcel have the proper Zip Code included in the address wherever possible. This is a good time to advise

your friends of your Zip Code when mailing cards to infrequent correspondents," the postmaster added. The new Christmas stamp will be available on Nov. 10 at all post offices. This is a new stamp, in Christmas colors and theme, with four designs available in each sheet of stamps.

"We wish to remind you that care should be exercised in packing all gifts, too frequently inadequate wrapping and tying of parcels result in arrival in a damaged condition," Reese said.

"PACKING materials should hold all contents that are subject to breakage and damage so that they will not move inside the parcel. Securely wrap and fasten each parcel and address plainly."

"At a later date we will announce the hours as they will be extended for Christmas mailings. Mail early—wrap securely—include Zip Code—address plainly and we will get them there for Christmas."

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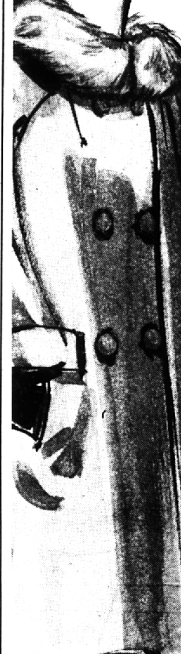
