

World Community Day To Stress Peace

"The destiny of the world is in the hands of America because she has the power. That power can best be used in the service of humanity."

These words uttered by Sir Sarnat Gunesarone, permanent delegate to the United Nations from Ceylon since 1955, contained some

of the most impressive truths heard by Mrs. F. L. McNabb, 3073 Bradford Drive, Birmingham, Michigan, at a 10-day Leadership Training Program at the UN in New York City in May.

It was sponsored by the National Council of United Church Women as part of the national program for Education and Action for Peace Week.

IN THE COMPANY of 39 women from other states and 12 from the developing nations, she heard UN leaders speak on various phases of the UN.

Much said pointed to America's vital role in the destiny of the world and implied the relevance of the Christian ethic to world affairs.

Mrs. McNabb attended as a denominational representative of the United Church of Christ.

She will speak on the World Community Day Program of the Birmingham Council of United Church Women on Friday, Nov. 6, at 10 a.m. at First Presbyterian Church, 1609 West Maple.

The UN experiences will serve as background for her talk which is entitled, "Peace-Man and Nations in a Changing World."

MRS. McNABB, a graduate of Northwestern University and a member of Phi Beta Kappa, has long been active in the Council for Christian Social Action of the United Church of Christ.

Students and teachers participated in what seemed to be the most responsive rally in the school's history. During the rally, six members of the faculty were called up to lead the school in a victory chant.

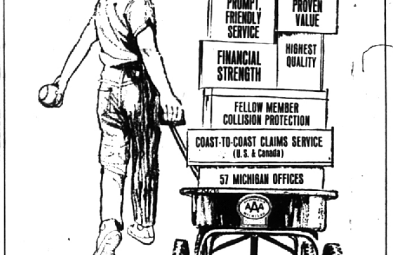
After the assembly Mr. McGuire, the principal, commented that it was the best pep assembly he had ever seen.
