## Maple Civics Classes Attend Traffic Court

Held at the Municipal Building in Birmingham, the court is run entirely by students. Presiding as judge was Mike Koonke. Serving as court recorder was Martie Allen and Jane Hilder was foreman of the jury.

As the judge conducted the court, the jury heard eight cases, ranging from the running of a stop sign to the operating of a car with the passenger riding on the outside of the vehicle.

**THE PUNISHMENTS** varied according to the offense, from a talk with the traffic referee, writing essays on traffic safety to a suspension of a driver's license for 29 days.

Students participating in the court take their responsibility very seriously. When a traffic offender has to face a person of his own age, the results have been proven to be much more effective.

The general opinion of students who have participated in the session of Traffic Court is that it is very efficient and an excellent way of teaching the responsibilities of driving.

In this poll, the Republican candidates triumphed, as they have done in past school polls, with the significant exception of the Presidential race. Here, President Johnson edged Sen. Goldwater, 78-66, gaining a 55 per cent majority.

In the other races, Gov. Romney soundly beat Cong. Staebler, 132-19. Sen. Hart was edged by Mrs. Peterson, 74-77, and Cong. Broomfield easily won over Mr. Sierawski, 123-24.

In order to follow the changing popularities of the various candidates, there will be another student pool before the election.

for the 18th Congressional District, spoke to the students on the national campaign.

He was the guest of the Forum, a student discussion organization, whose function is to stimulate interest in current affairs.
