A wedding breakfast at Fox & Hounds Inn followed the ceremony, while an evening reception was held at Glen Oaks Country Club in Farmington.

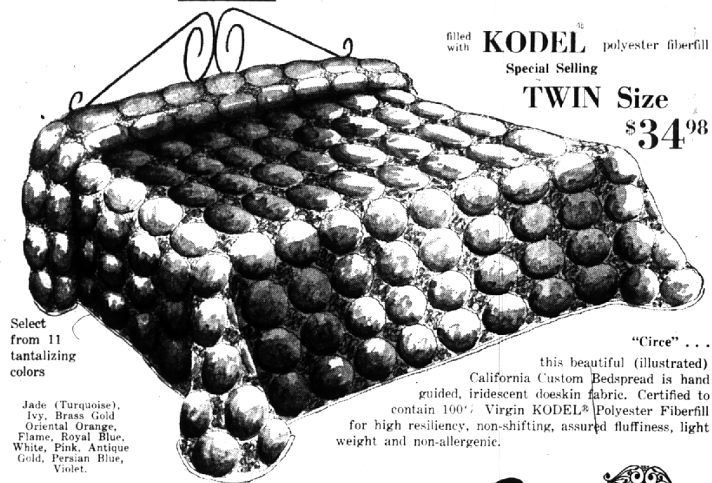
After their return from a northern Michigan honeymoon, the newlyweds will live in Royal Oak.

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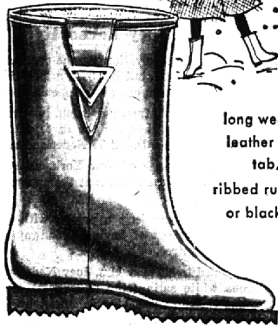
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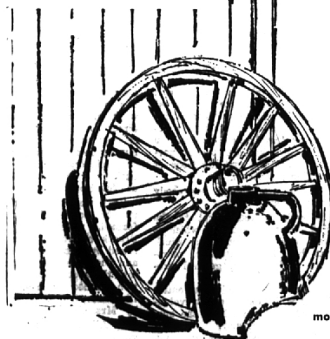
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
