The alumnae association, the Fathers Club and the Mercy League have agreed to raise \$300,000 during the next three years on a personal solicitation basis to provide furnishings for the residence and student center which are presently under construction on the campus.

These buildings are being financed by a Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency loan and the Sisters of Mercy, a \$5,000,000 debt which the college will have to reduce over the next forty years.

Needlework Ingathering A Success

The Birmingham Bloomfield Branch of The Needlework Guild of America announces that the ingathering, held on Oct. 13, was a success.

There were almost 5000 garments and household articles, and \$2000 donated by members and collected by directors and presidents. This is well over the total of last year.

The ten social service agencies which the guild supplies sent representatives to the Unitarian Church, where the ingathering was held, to receive boxes of clothing and supplies for distribution to families in need.

THE ONLY requirement for membership is an annual donation of two new identical articles. Members know how much a child appreciates a new garment over one that is used, and very often this represents the only new article of clothing the child has ever had.

Many children are unable to start school each fall because of inadequate shoes and wearing apparel, until after the ingathering and distribution by the agencies.

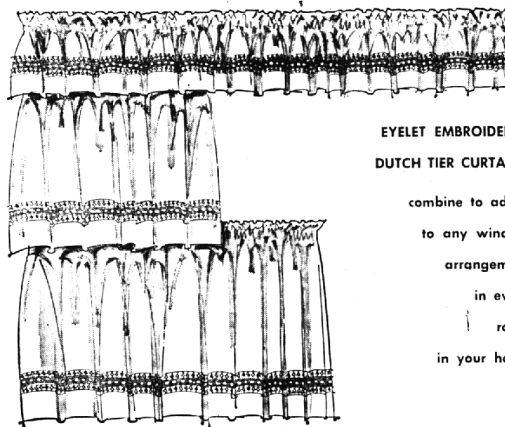

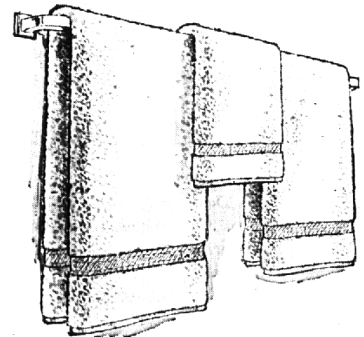
