Paradoxically, these remarkable properties of the liver obscure its diagnosis when diseased.

The behavior of a liver enzyme which enters the blood in amounts proportional to liver damage was announced recently at the American Society of Clinical Pathologists meeting at Miami by Dr. E. M. Knights of 5153 Echo Rd., Bloomfield Hills.

Music Prof To Play in OU Concert

Pianist Henry Harris, professor of music at Michigan State University, will present a concert performance at 8:15 p.m. Friday in Oakland University's Little Theatre, according to Dr. David Di Chiera, director of the OU Concert-Lecture series.

Harris studied several years in Leipzig and later at the Juillard Graduate School where he received a fellowship. He has performed in many Michigan communities and has been soloist with the Philadelphia, Minneapolis, Cincinnati, Pittsburgh symphonies.

BEFORE JOINING the MSU faculty, the pianist was on the staff of the Philadelphia Conservatory of Music and the State College of Iowa. He has taught at Interlochen Music Camp since 1951.

The MSU artist has performed frequently on educational television programs throughout the country and is performer-lecturer in the radio series "Piano Profiles," carried by educational stations.
