

Eagles Defeat Maples; Groves Wins

Ferndale Earns 28-14 Triumph

Ferndale's Bob Super, facing an eight-man Seaholm front wall, chose to bypass the air waves and used the Eagles' ground attack to the best of its advantage in a 28-14 win over the Maples Friday night.

Seaholm, trying to get to Super and halt the Eagles' passing game, instead found themselves time and again crossed up by the slashing runs of halfback Ken Luxton.

The fleet-footed junior continually skirted the Maples' ends for good yardage and netted 135 yards in 14 carries, including two touchdowns.

SUPER'S BALL - HANDLING and Luxton's running proved too much for the Maples, who twice fought back to make a run at it before Ferndale wrapped it up in the final stanza.

Key man for Seaholm was quarterback Dick Swaney, who called a brilliant game and was a stand-out on defense, before suffering a slight concussion in the fourth quarter.

Swaney stalled one Ferndale drive with an interception and made the tackle on numerous occasions that prevented Ferndale backs from breaking away.

The victory, third in four starts for Ferndale, left them on top with Kimball and Berkley at 3-1. Seaholm remained tied with Hazel Park and Southfield at 1-3.

Late in the first period, Ferndale scored the first TD as Super engineered a 70-yard drive. Luxton got the six points on a five-yard burst off tackle.

LUXTON GOT HIS second touchdown of the night when, with five minutes left before the half, he took a reverse handout and scampered 22 yards to paydirt.

But the Maples came back. Halfback Don Evans with a scoring toss that covered 60 yards. The PAT failed.

COUNTRY DAY failed to add to the team's record.

Plan 50th Homecoming Game at Country Day

Detroit Country Day, after suffering its second loss of the year to Maumee, O., Saturday, 12-6, now turns its attention to arch-rival Groose Point University School this week end.

The GPUS game will serve as the highlight of the school's 50th homecoming anniversary and will decide the fate of the Cup that traditionally awaits the winner of the contest.

The half-time program will center on the dedicating of the new football field, the F. Alden Shaw Field, named in honor of Country Day's founder.

THE GAME itself is an intense rivalry that had its beginnings back in 1925. The winner's Cup was introduced in 1936 and has been up for grabs ever since. Game time is 2 p.m.

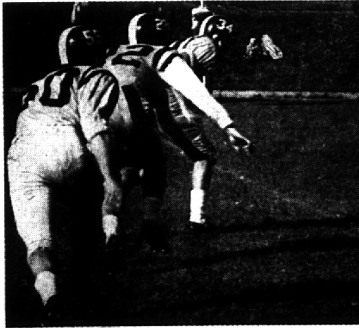
Kimball Harriers Trip Seaholm

Royal Oak Kimball added frost-bite to the case last Thursday by winning the Southeastern Michigan Association cross-country title, defeating second-place Seaholm, 28-48.

The victory was the second for the Knights over the Maples this year. Two weeks ago they defeated Seaholm in a dual meet to end the Maples' winning string at nine for the year and 23 in a row.

The winners placed six runners within the first 10 finishers, gain possession of the league crown that Seaholm had dominated for the last few seasons.

HAZEL PARK was third with 79 points, followed by Ferndale with 104, Berkley with 142 and Southfield with 114.

IN INTERSTATE GAME

CUS Routes Cranbrook, 50-0

Homecoming week end turned out to be more of a nightmare than anything else for Cranbrook's football squad as the Cranes were shellacked by Cleveland University School, 50-0.

The visitors ran up a total of 444 yards gained and scored in every quarter to rout Cranbrook, winless now in two league contests.

The Cranes fumbled five times, once on their own goal line, and failed to score until the last four seconds when quarterback Tom Van Horn rolled around left end on an option play into the end zone.

EVER THEN things went wrong. The officials ruled the clock ran out before the ball snapped and the TD was nullified. It would have been the first for the Cranes over CUS in four years.

University School covered 55 yards in 10 plays to score the first TD of the game in the first quarter and held a 7-0 lead going into the second period.

They added three more before the half was up, the first on a 75-yard drive that took 13 plays, the latter two resulting from two Cranbrook fumbles.

CUS recovered one loose ball on the fourth quarter and another later, then grabbed another fumble at Cranbrook's 32 and tallied in four plays.

Another Crane fumble led to the first score of the second half. University took over on the Crane 57 and went the remaining distance to lead 34-0.

CRANBROOK MADE it to the CUS 25 before stalling and the visitors added two more TD's in the fourth quarter.

The Cranes traveled 87 yards in their final bid to score with Burz Mieras and Van Horn combining on two long pass plays before time ran out.

Cranbrook, 1-4 over-all, will play Western Reserve Saturday in a scheduled Interstate Prep contest.

Rick Dreffuss was individual winner, placing first for Kimball in 9:57.0 as Seaholm's ace, Scott Bradley, finished second in 9:57.2. The Knights also were 4th, 6th, 8th, 9th, 10th and 13th.

Seaholm placed runners in 5th, 7th, 15th, 17th, 21st and 28th spots behind Bradley, Ken Lenowicz of Hazel Park was third ahead of Kimball's Howard Allen.

OTHER SEAHOLM runners to finish were Mike Johnstone in 15th, Terry Fremuth in 17th, Jim Lyness in 21st and Terry McConnell in 28th.

Kimball also swept the reserve championship, topping Seaholm, 23-32. Cary Brown and Mark Dutton were one-two ahead of Maples Alex Grether and Steve Bell.

Seaholm will run in the state regional, Saturday at Cass Benton Park. Class B will start at 10 a.m. with Class A at 10:20 a.m. Finals will be held a week later at Eastern Michigan U. for the top two schools. Seaholm has won seven of its last 10 regional.

Jays Drop 21-0 Contest To Kimball

Southfield, tied with Seaholm at 1-3 in the Southeastern Michigan Association, threw up a good ground defense against Kimball Friday night, but failed to stop the Knights' passing attack.

The combination of quarterback Bob Miles to end Andy Stuhl accounted for all three Kimball touchdowns in the league-leaders' 21-0 victory over the Jays.

SOUTHFIELD only had one good scoring chance. They reached the Knights' 11 but fumbled and Kimball recovered to dash the drive.

Miles hit on 8 of 11 tosses for 93 yards, but his three-to-Stuhl did the real damage. His first came in the second period and covered 15 yards to cap an 85-yard drive. Then, in the same stanza, he connected with a short one-yard scoring toss. The final touchdown came in the fourth quarter on a 15-yarder. Kimball had total yardage, 211-108.

The SMA, heading into its last week of loop games, could witness a cross-way tie for first in the first year of operation.

KIMBALL L. BERKLEY and Ferndale, all 3-1, would tie for the title with victories tomorrow. Kimball meets Seaholm, Berkley plays Southfield and Ferndale faces Hazel Park.

Barons Easy Victors; Lakers Shocked, 26-7

Bloomfield Hills coach Bill Tunniff emptied his bench and filled the field with sophomores against Clarenceville Friday as his Barons rolled to a 26-7 victory and a piece of third place in the Wayne-Oakland League.

West Bloomfield, however, ran into the shocker of the season, as winless Brighton celebrated homecoming in fine fashion, throttling the Lakers, 26-7.

Brighton capitalized on six West Bloomfield fumbles to score four touchdowns in the first half and then held off any threat the Lakers could mount in the final two periods.

IF WANT to coach West Bloomfield's only score came in the second quarter when quarterback Greg Heppinstall scampered around end for a seven-yard TD run.

The winners scored twice each in the first two periods. Quarterback Bob Cameron passed 45 yards to Mike Stillwagon and then sneaked over for another.

Mike Fournier also hauled in a Cameron aerial for six yards and another touchdown.

Bloomfield Hills, after a lean season last year and a rocky beginning this season, has started to jell under Tunniff and now sports a 3-2 mark.

The Barons turned out their best offensive show so far as they scored in every period to trounce Clarenceville, after the visitors had scored on the first play from scrimmage, a 68-yard gallop by Ray Parker.

Falcons Edge Detroit Central

Birmingham Groves came out of a three-game scoring drought Friday afternoon to post a 13-6 victory over Detroit Central before a cheering homecoming crowd.

The Falcons, still winless in Northwest Suburban League play, picked up their second non-loop win of the current campaign even though they were decisively outplayed by the losers.

Central, playing minus their top back, Ronnie Hampton, proved more than a test for the Falcons. The Blazers picked up 210 yards rushing and held Groves to just 72. They also earned 11 first downs to the Falcons' six, but Groves turned a couple of breaks into scores.

THE DETROIT SCHOOL was inside Groves' 15-yard line three times but the Falcon defense rose to the occasion and thwarted all three bids.

The two teams played a scoreless first quarter, with Central having possession of the ball for the majority of the period, but unable to get a sustained drive going.

However, late in the period, Central halted the Falcons on the mid-field stripe. On fourth down, a roughing-the-kicker penalty gave Groves the ball on the Detroit 36 and from there the Falcons went in to score.

A 25-yard pass from Mike Rafferty to Floyd Cosmi gave the winners a first down on the six and two plays later, fullback Tom McKennie hauled over from the four. Jim Fowler added the PAT.

With only 1:50 left in the half, Central's Roland Wood brought Detroit to within one point when he shot over from the two to make it 7-6.

THE FINAL SCORE of the contest came late in the third period and was again set up by a Central mistake. A bad snap from center resulted in a Groves first down on Central's seven.

Jim Andrews sailed around right end for the clincher several plays later.

Central threatened in the closing minutes, completing several long passes but couldn't get beyond the Groves' 20. The Falcons are now 2-4 overall.

Groves faces Oak Park in a league encounter tomorrow.
