2 Last-Quarter TD's Crush Brother Rice

For the second week in a row, Brother Rice came close to emerging with their first win in two years in the Central Catholic football division.

The Warriors, who last Sunday lost a heartbreaker to U. of D., 13-12, led for three periods Sunday against Salinas before bowing, 20-7.

Looking more like a troublemaker than ever, Rice scored on Dan Corrigan, the Warriors' most dangerous runner, dove in from the one to cap a 68-yard march. Corrigan led Rice back in yardage gained during the game. O'Connor added the PAT.

BLOOMFIELD HILLS came away with a victory in the annual Clarenceville International cross-country meet for Class A schools. The Barons posted 63 points to easily defeat second-place Thurston with 80.

Bloomfield's Tom Kearney was individual winner with a time of 10:24.

Kearney also pulled down top honors in the Wayne-Oakland League championships held at Kensington Park Friday. His winning time was a fine 10:18.

Bloomfield, however, finished second in the team standings to Milford, 23-48. West Bloomfield soundly up sixth with 183.

Appoint Southfield Resident District 4 Umpire-in-Chief

Edward A. Bryant, former Southfield Little League president, has been named District 4 Little League umpire-in-chief. Announcement was made by District Administrator Robert D. Dodge after appointment was confirmed by national Little League umpire-in-chief Howard Gair.

Bryant, who was in charge of the Southfield Little League umpire program last season, will head all umpires in District No. 4 next season. District No. 4 includes the counties of Oakland, Shiawassee, Genesee, Livingston and Clinton.

A SOUTHFIELD resident at 2806 E. 14th St. Bryant has been in the program. He has been employed at Southfield High School since 1955 as teacher and coach. He has coached football, basketball and baseball and is currently head baseball coach.

Bryant replaces Joseph Anderson who resigned the post this fall.

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Tighten Pike, Muskellunge Regulations

Tighter fishing regulations are on tap for 1965 to ease angling and spearing pressure on muskellunge in Lake St. Clair and to check the steady decline of northern pike populations throughout many parts of Michigan.

In coming to the rescue of the two troubled species last week, the Conservation Commission extended the closed season on pike and muskies from March 1 through May 14 in all inland waters.

The new off-limits period, 34 days longer than before, will protect these fish during their entire spawning season when they are easy marks for being cropped in wholesale numbers.

OTHER ACTION taken last week to safeguard muskies against being over-fished will raise the minimum size limit from 30 to 34 inches and add a catch quota of two per day in inland waters. Both changes are also effective next year. Previously, there has been no catch limit on muskies.

In a move to make Michigan and Ontario regulations more uniform on common fishing waters, a closed season on muskie and pike was set from Feb. 1 through the first Friday of June in Lake St. Clair, and the St. Clair and Detroit rivers.

Date Set For Zollner, Kerbawy Suit

A hearing date of Feb. 9 has been set for the \$5.5 million suit brought by former Detroit Piston general manager Nick Kerbawy against club owner Fred Zollner.

Kerbawy, who lives in Bloomfield Hills, is seeking damages in U.S. District Court for alleged libel, slander, conspiracy and breach of contract in connection with his dismissal from the basketball club in 1961.

KERBAWY'S CONTRACT, said to have been a 29-year pact, was terminated when Zollner claimed Kerbawy was participating in a proxy fight being waged for control of the Detroit Lions.

Kerbawy's suit claims that his "acceptance as a leading public figure in the field of professional sports" was damaged when Zollner made public a letter claiming Kerbawy took part in the stock fight.

What was the biggest crowd ever to see a football game? ... Oddly enough, the record was NOT set at a college or pro game, but at a high school championship game at Soldier Field, Chicago, in 1937... The attendance was 115,000... That was the game in which the fabled high school athlete, Bill DeCorrevont played.
