The state question on the "Massachusetts Ballot" appears at the top of the ballot. Below it are the party levers for the candidates for the state and national offices. To the right are the candidates for the State Board of Education, Michigan State University Board of Trustees, Wayne State University Board of Governors and five Oakland County offices. Below right will appear the names of candidates for the nonpartisan newly-created State Court of Appeals, Oakland County Circuit Court and Probate Court.</p> <p>If a voter desires to split a ballot, there are two methods which may be used: A mixed ballot in which no lever is pulled at the heading of any party column but in which there are levers pulled before the candidates of more than one party; and the split ticket where a lever is pulled at the top of a party column and levers are pulled before the names of candidates in other party columns. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m. on election day.</p>

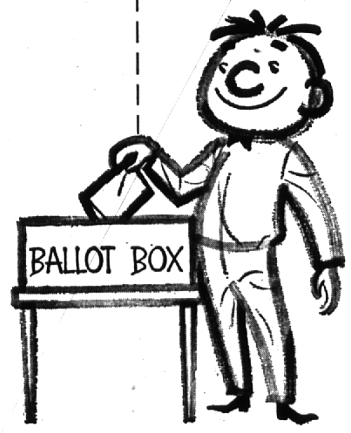
