defeated Glenn R. Johnson of the Citizens Party, 2,351 to 1,113. W. Roy Hawkins, a Republican, easily won an unopposed two-year term by defeating his Democratic challenger, Henriette Friedman, 3,525 to 2,204.

In the presidential and gubernatorial contests, there was significant ticket-splitting by the 7,926 voters who went to the polls.

Sen. Harry Goldwater edged President Johnson by a meager 47-vote margin, while Gov. George Romney was walloping his Democratic challenger by more than 5 to 1.

The final tally in the presidential race was Goldwater, 3,220; Johnson, 3,872. Romney defeated Neil Staebler, 5,892 to 1,892.

More than 83 per cent, or 7,926 of 9,490 registered voters, went to the polls.

IN BLOOMFIELD Township, all Republican candidates for local office were unopposed for reelection. Homer Case led the slate with 9,723 votes for supervisor; Mrs. Deloris Hulet, 9,434 for clerk; Arno Hulet, 9,530 for treasurer; Samuel Reeve and Frank Swindell, 9,030 and 8,892 for trustee; Mrs. Alice Gilbert, 9,159 for justice of the peace; and Joe Rayman, 8,865 for constable.

Six candidates were unopposed for the library board. They are: Ralph Heiler, 8,813; Ann W. Sheldon, 8,804; Betty Abbott, 8,878; John Ramsey, 8,834; Mary K. King, 8,859; and Lucile Roehm, 8,701.

Over 92 per cent of the registered voters—15,377 of 16,569—gave Goldwater a 2-1 margin over President Johnson. The final vote was 10,060 to 4,586.

Gov. Romney easily outdistanced Staebler, rolling up a total of 13,265, compared to only 1,503 for his Democratic opponent.

"Your honor, may I speak?"

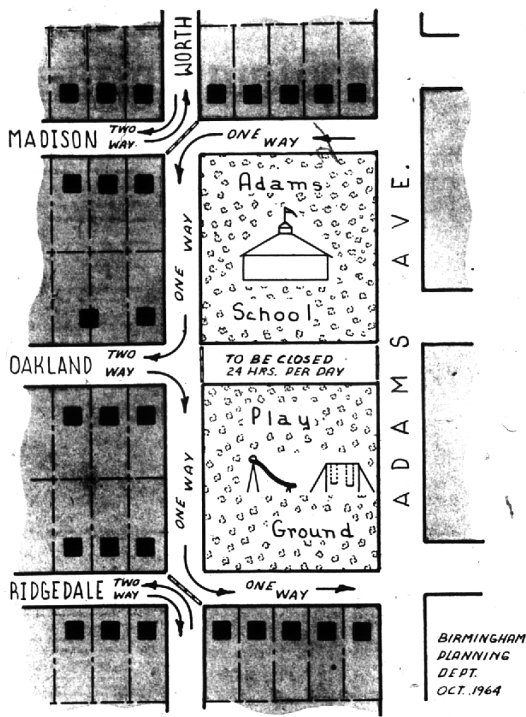
The judge granted the defense attorney a five-minute recess to consult with his client and when they returned, Rann said Gravlin did not "wish to make a statement."

The judge said Dr. Tauber dwelled too much on past events and "littered, if any, on the present."

Thorburn ordered the examination of Gravlin to continue in Troy Municipal Court, but no date was set for resumption of the hearing.

Oakland Traffic Detour

UM Health Service Has Increased Use

The University of Michigan Health Service handled almost 116,000 clinical visits during the 1963-4 academic year.

The service, which was available to 34,872 students last year, received 42,841 general clinical calls, 11,374 allergy cases, and 9,194 mental health cases in the 116,000 total.

In its annual report to the president, the service reported that while the number of cases handled had increased over the previous year, the number of hospital days spent by students decreased.

Many of the cases, which averaged out to about 3.5 calls per U-M student, were routine visits for X-rays (16,808 visits) and several influenza immunization programs.

The volume of drug prescriptions increased by 5.8 per cent over 1962-3 to 40,750.
