## GM Torch Drive Gifts Set All Time Record

General Motors and its Detroit area employees announced contributions to the 1964 Torch Drive totaling a record \$3,482,978.

The gift was reported by Louis C. Goad, executive vice president of General Motors, to a United Foundation report luncheon at the Statler-Hilton Hotel, 1111 10th St., at 10:30 a. m. The total given by the corporation and its employees in the 16-year history of the Torch Drive.

Goad announced that employee contributions totaled \$2,947,978; salaried employees gave \$2,109,141 and hourly employees contributed \$838,837. General Motors added a corporate contribution of \$535,000.

**GOAD PAID** tribute to GM employees and leaders of the UAW and other unions representing GM hourly rate employees for their support of the Torch Drive, and their efforts in the fund-raising campaign.

He pointed out that in the 16 Torch Drives including this one, General Motors and its employees have contributed more than \$22,980,000 to the United Foundation, a larger amount than the entire quota of the 1964 campaign.

"We are very proud that General Motors and GM people can make this contribution to such a vital community project. It's another record for us, and that is another one of our records that we like to keep on breaking every year," Goad declared.

General Motors dramatized its 1964 contribution to the luncheon audience with a skit based on an election theme. As the "retirees" were telephoned in by Goad and by representatives of GM's hourly and salaried employees to a weary "munching man," two GM girls tabulated them on a large poster similar to those typically seen in election campaign headquarters.

## City Must Issue Condemn Notices Before Building

**LATHROP**—The city council learned at its meeting Monday that it must serve all 4,000 residents with condemnation notices if the City were to acquire a 12,000-square-foot area needed for community service buildings.

City Attorney Everett Hayes said he was advised by lawyers in the condemnation field that the City must condemn in order to build the city hall and recreation area at 12 Mile Road and Santa Barbara because the bank owners of the property will not sell.

Acceptance of the condemnation proceedings must be approved by all Lathrop residents, according to restrictions involving all eight subdivisions.

Hayes said he would have the cost of the action, along with the summons, at the council's next meeting in two weeks.
