2. **ROSE BUSHES** should be killed now about 6" to 8" with "borrowed" dirt. Prune tea roses back to 18" to 24". DO NOT MULCH until around is frozen to a depth of 2" or more. Good materials for mulching are: ROSE COLLARS filled with PEAT MOSS or BUCK-WHEAT HULLS. MARSH HAY or STRAW.
3. Why didn't you vote on the 3rd?
4. When **CHRYSANTHEMUMS** are through blooming cut them back to 4" or 5" from the ground or dirt or soil.
5. The **CIDER & DOUGHNUT HOLE & CANDY & APPLE** deal on last Saturday was so well received that we invite you all to another one—**SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 14th**. Everyone is welcome (except the 3 lads who each crammed 2 pockets, 1 hand and 1 mouth with candy).
