### Maples Win X-Country Regional Run

Seaholm's cross-country squad won its eighth regional championship in the past 11 years at Cass Benton Park Saturday, besting 20 other schools, and, in so doing, qualified for the state finals at Ypsilanti this Saturday.

The Maples garnered 78 points to edge second-place Milford, who finished with 80. Bloomfield Hills was 14th in 10-47.5, while Mike Johnstone was 27th, Jim Lynn 32nd, Terry Fremuth 41st and Alex Grether 54th.

Seaholm and Milford will move on to the state finals at Eastern Michigan University Saturday. Classes C and D run at 10:30 a.m., followed by Class B individuals. Class A teams, Class A individuals and Class A teams.

The Class A championship, which the Maples will be defending this year, is scheduled to start around 11:20 a.m.

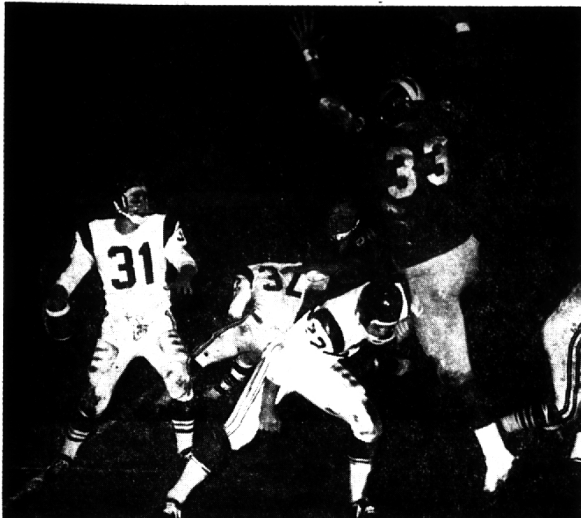

## Berkley Rips S'field; Earns Share of Title

Berkley High drubbed Southfield, 41-6, Friday, behind the expert passing of Rick Krumm to finish 4-1 in the Southeastern Michigan Association and earn their first football title since 1952.

The Jays never had a chance to get going as Berkley struck for four first-half touchdowns, three in the second quarter, and went on to hand Southfield its fourth league loss and a tie for last place with Hazel Park.

KRUMM COMPLETED 9 of 10 passes, for 125 yards, his best performance of the year. He fired a nine-yard TD pass to Jerry Boreland the first time the Bears had the ball.

Tackle Dave Kakkuri set up the second score when he recovered a Jay fumble at the Southfield 41. Krumm then hit speedy Jim Prince, who went 34 yards to paydirt.

In the second quarter, Southfield's Rich Smigelki dropped him to punt, but a bad pass forced him to run and he was dropped at the Bears' 43, where Berkley again went in to score, with Prince going the final eight.

Bill Spurgeon then intercepted a Jay pass and Krumm hit Spurgeon with a screen pass good for 27-0 at halftime.

BERKLEY SCORED from the opening kickoff in the second half, taking just five plays to up the margin to 34-0 before Southfield got its lone score, Simmons hitting Smigelki for a six-yard TD pass.

The first quarter ended in a scoreless tie Friday, but Kimball drew first blood in the second quarter when they went in front, 6-0.

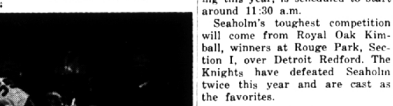
