Plan to Stock State Lakes With Salmon

Plans to stock Higgins and Torch lakes next spring with kokanee salmon from Colorado were announced by the Dept. of Conservation.

The project will mark the start of a long-range effort to establish the kokanee, a landlocked strain of Pacific Coast sockeye salmon, in a broad list of Michigan waters.

The kokanee will be the first introduction of a game fish species into Michigan on a large scale under the now state fish management program adopted last June.

IN LATE December or early January, the Fish Section will obtain up to 2 1/2 million kokanee eggs from Colorado. The eggs will go to Department hatcheries at Wolf Lake, Van Buren county, and Harrietia, Westford county, for hatching and rearing to fry size. The fry will be planted in Torch and Higgins lakes in early spring.

This process will be repeated during each of the following three years. By the end of 1968, brood stocks should be firmly established in the two lakes, and Michigan will have its own source of eggs.

Torch and Higgins lakes were selected for the first plantings because they are big, cold and deep, and do not have large numbers of predator fish.

Future plans call for extensive stocking in Lake Michigan and such inland lakes as Crystal, Charlevoix, Walloon and Leelanau.

The kokanee has a normal four-year life cycle. Like most species of salmon, it spawns once and dies. At maturity it is about 14 inches long and weighs about a pound, although individual specimens may run larger.
