

Ex-Soldiers Offered Spare Time Service

Qualified men who have served as enlisted men or officers in any branch of the Armed Forces can join the U. S. Coast Guard Reserve in the pay grade they held at time of discharge.

During the term of enlistment, which may be three, four or six years, Coast Guard Reservists attend weekly drill meetings in their home town. Once a year they devote two weeks to training away from home.

Since these men receive a full day's pay for each drill period and regular pay for the annual two week's training, they find service in the U. S. Coast Guard Reserve can convert spare time into a worthwhile second income. In addition, they can retire with pay at the age of 60 after 20 years of service.
