gram was approved at the special school election Monday by slightly under a 4 to 1 margin. Unofficial totals showed the general millage proposition passed 1,677 for to 483 against. The proposition to issue bonds to pay for the program was endorsed, 1,987 to 407. These same unofficial returns showed only 2,162 persons out of a possible 10,000 or 21.6 per cent of the district's seven voting places.

City Commissioners Monday evening hardly gave Samuel J. Lavine, district highway engineer for the state, time to explain the state's final proposal for the installation of the new 25-10 traffic signal system before they moved to accept the proposition. Estimated cost of the three new signals at 14 Mile, Chapin and Hazel, together with the modernization of those at Lincoln, Maple and Oakland, will cost an estimated \$32,425.

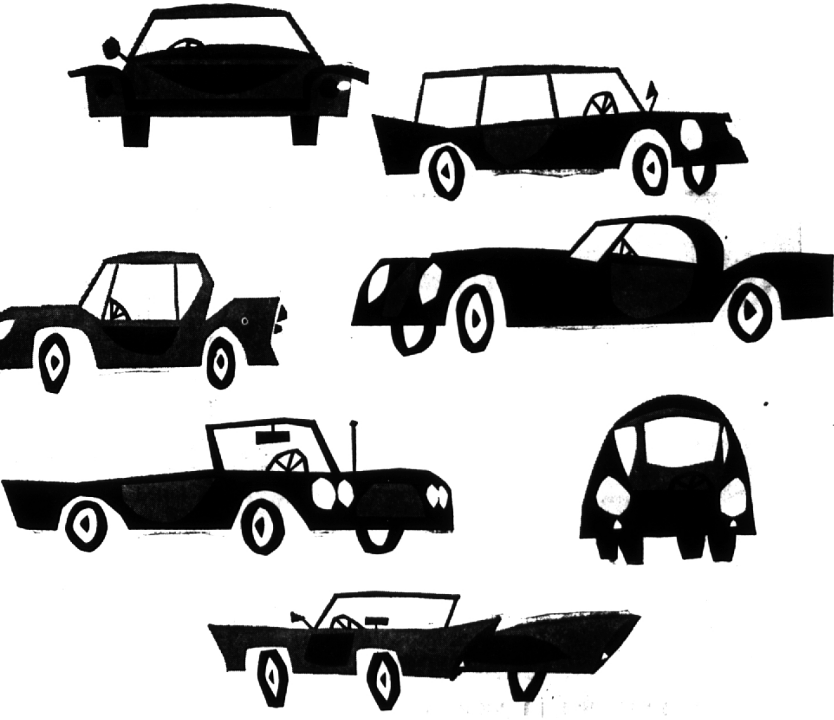
